

The exclusive area is defined as Lee Park inclusive; Memorial Drive roadway and associated sidewalks along the borders of Lee Park from Stanley Street to Judge Avenue; Judge Avenue and associated sidewalks from Leask Street to Lee Avenue; Lakeshore Drive roadway and the associated sidewalks beginning at the north border of Lee Park extending to 100 meters south past the intersection at Judge Avenue. (See map attached)

#### BACKGROUND

For the past several years the World's Finest Shows has offered a spring midway including rides, games and food services. In association with this show they have had an agreement to donate a percentage of the receipts from the event to Summer in the Park. Last year this amounted to \$16,448.

The World's Finest Shows event takes place within the boundaries of Lee Park. In the past there have been vendors who have set up in close proximity to the event along the associated roadways and sidewalks and as a result have competed directly with the event by offering similar products/services.

By granting the event exclusivity of the areas described above on these days, the activities in and about the area of their show are controlled. This prevents other vendors or attractions from setting up in areas in the vicinity of the show and, in turn, supports the sponsorship of the Summer in the Park community event.



#### RECOMMENDATION

That CSBU 2011-52 be received for information purposes only.

#### BACKGROUND

On January 26, 2011, Council passed a Resolution #2011-68 requesting Staff to complete a comprehensive review of City owned Lake Nipissing access points. This report will outline the methodology for the comprehensive review, and will recommend the desired time frame for completion.

In November of 2006, Planning Services Staff catalogued the existing City owned Lake Nipissing access points (excluding Municipal parks and beaches). The results of this study identified fortyfour points of public access to Lake Nipissing. It also indicated which of these access point contained buried infrastructure, as well as indicating patterns of use. The 2006 study exists solely as a reference for these access points, and does not include recommendations or suggested future actions.

Based on the 2006 study, and the recent Resolution from Council, Planning Services has begun the preliminary work required to complete an updated review. This review will again look at all access points (excluding parks and beaches) and will provide recommendations to address the most appropriate use of these lands.

The first component of the review will include:

- A review of the 2006 access points, contrasting them with Engineering Services and City mapping / GIS to confirm locations, City ownership, and to establish if any access points from the 2006 study have been disposed of, or if any new or previously unrecognized access points have been established.
- With the current list of City owned Lake Nipissing access points, each access point will be reviewed in conjunction with Engineering Services to determine if any buried infrastructure (watermains, sanitary sewers, etc) exist at these points.
- Planning Services Staff will undertake site visits to each access point to photograph and document the current conditions and uses. To help understand the full spectrum of uses, Staff is suggesting both a winter visit and a summer visit to identify seasonal access usage. Staff completed a winter inspection of the access points on February 22, 2011. This was after the family day long weekend to determine the use of access points for winter activity.
- An analysis will be completed of the current maintenance cost associated with each of these access points. This will include costs associated with seasonal upkeep, snow removal, improvements and road maintenance (where applicable).

At the completion of the analysis described above, Staff will be holding a series of public meetings with the adjacent land owners, users, and other community stakeholders.

These meetings will be held in stages, with a small section of access points being dealt with at one meeting. These meetings will be used to provide information on the various access points and the observations that the City has made. It is anticipated these meetings will be held in the fall of 2011 through 2012.

At the completion of the public meetings, Staff will report back to Council with recommendations on the various access points. This report will outline, on an access by access basis, the suggested course of action. Actions may include, but are not limited to, increased maintenance requirements, improvements or disposal of lands. The final study with recommendations will be completed by Fall 2012.



#### RECOMMENDATION

That the City of North Bay assume direct operation of its water and wastewater treatment facilities beginning July 1, 2011 in order to direct the long term sustainability of the facilities, and;

That City Council direct staff to make all necessary preparations to ensure the transition and City operations begin on July 1, 2011.

#### **BACKGROUND**

As a result of concerns over the long term management of infrastructure, City staff recommended that Council give 1 years notice to terminate the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA) agreement on May 5th, 2010.

On Monday, January 24, 2011 Council passed Resolution No. 2011-55, directing staff to prepare a business plan detailing the costs and other considerations associated with taking the operation of the Water and Wastewater Treatment Facilities in-house. The in-house plan was to be compared to the unsolicited proposal received from the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA).

#### **ANALYSIS/OPTIONS**

A broad committee of staff as well as an external consultant completed the detailed self-perform plan. The objectives of the in-house plan include the continued emphasis on the core operations of producing clean, safe drinking water and the effective treatment of the City's wastewater. An equally important objective was to ensure and improve the long term sustainability of facilities through better regular maintenance.

#### Personnel

By utilizing the existing senior management structure, the self perform model would increase unionized staff by 12 new positions including 4 Operators, 3 Mechanics, 1 SCADA Tech and 3 Labourers and a clerk. Two of the 12 new positions (a mechanic and labourer) will report through Public Works to assist existing crews to maintain the sewage lift stations. The balance of the new employees will be dedicated to the facilities (water treatment plant; wastewater treatment plant, pumping stations, reservoirs, etc.) and are regarded as the appropriate requirements for staff dedicated to this infrastructure.

The City's complement of proposed staff is very similar to what OCWA uses with the exception of a staff electrician. Rather than have a staff electrician, the self-perform model adds an additional SCADA Tech. This position could be filled by an electrician with SCADA and programming experience, but staff believes that more coverage is needed on the SCADA systems. The self perform model includes the costs of contracting the day to day needs of an electrician as well as utilizing the 2 existing electricians that are currently part of Public Works.

This new structure of dedicated City employees will enable more emphasis to be placed on the repairs and maintenance of our facilities. Directly managing City assets and having direct control over regular maintenance is regarded as necessary to ensure the long term sustainability of these critical City facilities. Due to the highly regulated nature of these operations, considerable costs are allocated to employee training. All new employees are to be crossed trained to ensure maximum flexibility. Investment in City employees is viewed as an advantage over contracting this work to 3<sup>rd</sup> parties. A thorough analysis of existing staff and recruiting potential new employees indicates that the self-perform model could be put in place by July 1, 2011. Personnel Costs including payroll and benefit costs are \$1,177,380 (36% of the total costs).

#### Utilities

Utility costs make up the largest component of the cost model at 41% of total costs. OCWA's original proposal had several options on ways to address the unpredictable costing for utilities, but all options involved the City taking the bulk of the risk. OCWA's first bid pegged the utility cost at \$951,475 but when staff reviewed the actual costs for 2010 we realized that this pegged amount was totally unrealistic. The actual cost for Hydro in 2010 was more than \$1,350,000. To ensure that both plans were being compared fairly we requested that OCWA peg utilities at \$1,350,000.

OCWA has revised their proposal suggesting that they would now be prepared to peg the hydro usage (kWh) at an annual level, but they have not provided any details. Without knowing the specifics it is difficult to evaluate the financial impact, but we do not believe that this offer would have any material effect on the financial analysis or on the recommendation of this report.

OCWA has stated that energy saving initiates would be shared on a 50% basis after their capital costs have been repaid. We believe this would be very difficult to account for as exact savings are rather difficult to determine if time-of-use Hydro billing is in place. OCWA has not provided any details as to how they would manage such a situation. We believe that the City should pay for utilities directly and our staff should be directly responsible for initiating and implementing energy saving projects. The City should benefit 100% from these initiatives and not have to share these savings.

### Other Costs

Other annual costs make up approximately 26% of the total costs. Other costs include: chemicals & other consumables, security, safety training, regulatory reporting, cleaning, garbage removal, grounds & snow removal, digester sludge hauling and tipping fees, annual inspections of boilers, cranes, flow meters; in-house and external lab supplies; vehicles and equipment rentals; computers, communications, & software; cell phones, pagers, internet, radio links; insurance - property, environmental; postage, courier & other incidentals.

#### Transitioning Costs

Various one-time transitioning costs are expected in the first year. These costs include personnel recruitment, legal fees, specialized tool purchases, and office furniture for the WWTP. An allowance of \$135,000 for one-time transition costs will be funding from the 1<sup>st</sup> year operational savings.

### Other Annual Savings:

Several years ago the City recognized that OCWA needed to employ local SCADA tech to maintain and expand North Bay's automated systems. Staff agreed to partially fund that salary from the minor capital operating account in the amount of \$30,000 per year. This expense will no longer be required in the self-perform model as these functions will be performed by new City employees.

Each year the City allocates approximately \$750,000 in capital projects that OCWA manages. This capital project funding is utilized to address major equipment refurbishing and repairs. OCWA charges 10% to manage these projects. In the proposed self-perform model, these projects would be managed by in-house staff. This would save the 10% management fee and recognizes that City staff are already significantly involved in Capital projects.

The calculated net present value of cumulative annual savings over the 10 year contract is \$1,144,047. Costs to operate the water and wastewater facilities are increasing. In the self-perform model costs in 2012 will increase 12% over the 2011 budget. If these operations are contracted to OCWA costs will increase 17%. Moving to the self-perform model will achieve cost avoidance.

#### *Insurance and Indemnity*

The issue of civil liability is addressed by insurance coverage which is included in the model costing. On the issue of regulatory liability, the City has all the required operational documentation and experience necessary to demonstrate due diligence. The City already has a demonstrated, clean track record of compliance with regulatory requirements concerning sophisticated operational systems.

With both OCWA and the City involved in the sewer and water systems, as is now the case, there can be difficulties which are not fully addressed by insurance or which could still require the City to be involved in litigation or regulatory issues.

### Other Communities That Self-Perform

A small sample of other communities that self-perform include: Sault Ste. Marie, Greater Sudbury, Pembroke, Thunder Bay, Timmins, Mattawa, Elliot Lake, West Nipissing, Barrie, Newmarket (York Region), Halton Hills, Milton, Welland, Cornwall, District of Muskoka which includes the communities of Bracebridge, Gravenhurst, Huntsville, Bala, Port Carling, MacTier, Port Severn and Baysville. It is not unusual for a city the size of North Bay to self-perform the operations of the water and wastewater facilities.

#### Consultant's Review Of Facilities And Proposals

Douglas Miller, Director of Consulting Services for CH2M HILL, has advised that the facilities should be maintained to a higher standard than has been the case. They have reviewed OCWA's proposal and the City's self-perform model are satisfied that the City's financial model will meet the desired objectives that include a higher standard of maintenance required for the long term sustainability of the City facilities. See attached Memorandum 02 dated April 14, 2011 and Mr. Miller's Resume.

#### **OPTIONS**

- 1) That the City of North Bay assume direct operation of its water and wastewater treatment facilities beginning July 1, 2011 in order to direct the long term sustainability of the facilities, and;
  - That City Council direct staff to make all necessary preparations to ensure the transition and City operations begin on July 1, 2011. This option is recommended.
- 2) Direct staff to negotiate a new contract with the Ontario Clean Water Agency for Council's consideration. This option is not recommended.

#### RECOMMENDED OPTION

That the City of North Bay assume direct operation of its water and wastewater treatment facilities beginning July 1, 2011 in order to direct the long term sustainability of the facilities, and:

That City Council direct staff to make all necessary preparations to ensure the transition and City operations begin on July 1, 2011.

Further to your request, I am providing this memo as a follow-up of my site visit to your various facilities during the week of March 28th, 2011. Many thanks to Karin and Mitch for their time and scheduling of the tour which included ALL the facilities (WTP, WWTP, Ellendale, Airport pumping station, Canadore pumping station and all 21 lift stations). Prior to my visit I was able to briefly review the draft condition assessments for both Ellendale and the WWTP. I also had the opportunity to review your budget model and organizational approach. This information coupled with gaining physical access to the facilities certainly provided me with the kind of detail needed to critically review your self-perform model.

As I indicated to your review committee during our meeting on March 29th, I can understand your concern about the general condition of the older facilities. In my opinion, I agree that these facilities have not been well cared for and an improvement in the day to day maintenance will be required as you move to improve the long term sustainability of your facilities. You certainly do not want your new facilities (Water Treatment Plant and Airport Standpipe/Booster Pumping Station) to be maintained in a similar fashion. These are all very valuable assets that need improved maintenance and care.

I have reviewed your self-perform financial model and I believe it is conservative and very viable. The labour complement you have included will add sufficient personnel resources to address the day to day issues related to repairs and maintenance. The labour rates for your licensed operators are very competitive and with an appropriate recruitment process you should have no problems filling the positions required. I have been involved in these types of transitions in the past and often the current operators simply move over to the new organization. As I have confirmed to you earlier, you always have the option to hire contracted operators for a short term transition period.

I have the utmost confidence in you and the staff to see this through and manage your assets appropriately. If we can be of further assistance, please don't hesitate to contact me.

A BY-LAW TO STOP UP, CLOSE AND CONVEY A PORTION OF THE LANEWAY IN A BLOCK BOUNDED BY MONTROSE AVENUE, CARRUTHERS STREET, ROBARTS AVENUE AND HARRISON STREET, IN THE CITY OF NORTH BAY

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and in the interest of The Corporation of the City of North Bay that part of the laneway abutting Lots 2184, 2185, 2186, 2187 and 2191, and Part of a Lane on Plan M-177 be closed, stopped up and sold to the abutting owners;

**AND WHEREAS** by Resolution No. 2010-581 passed on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of September, 2010, Council approved the closure of the laneway;

**AND WHEREAS** the laneway abutting Lots 2184, 2185, 2186, 2187 and 2191, and Part of a Lane on Plan M-177 are hereby declared to be surplus;

AND WHEREAS notice of this by-law was published once a week for two consecutive weeks in the North Bay Nugget, published in the City of North Bay;

**AND WHEREAS** no person has claimed that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the passing of this by-law nor applied to be heard in person or by his counsel, solicitor, or agent, the Council of the City nor a Committee of said Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- That certain part of the laneway in a block bounded by Montrose Avenue, Carruthers Street, Robarts Avenue and Harrison Street, abutting Lots 2184, 2185, 2186, 2187 and 2191, and Part of a Lane on Plan M-177 designated as Part 1, on Reference Plan 36R-12976 is hereby closed, stopped up and conveyed.
- The City shall transfer Part 1, on Reference Plan 36R-12976 to the owners of the lands abutting thereon, their successors or assigns, upon receipt of the consent in writing of the abutting registered owner, if the transfer is to be to a person other than the abutting registered owner.
- 3.(a) Subject to paragraph (b), in the event that an abutting owner to the said laneway does not consent to the disposition of the laneway within 60 days of the date of the passing of this by-law, then the clerk shall, upon request of an abutting owner of the opposite side of the laneway, give 30 days notice by prepaid registered mail to the abutting owner of the laneway to the effect that if the abutting owner does not agree to purchase one-half of the abutting laneway at a pro-rata share of the survey, legal, advertising costs and purchase price incurred in the laneway closing, then the said one-half of the laneway may be transferred to the opposite owner for the same cost.
  - (b) Upon receipt of an Irrevocable Consent of the disposition of the laneway from the adjacent owner then that portion of the laneway may be transferred upon registration of the by-law.
- 4. This by-law comes into force and effect upon a certified copy of the by-law being registered in the Land Titles Office for the District of Nipissing.

#### BY-LAW NO. 2011-106

# BEING A BY-LAW TO AMEND BY-LAW 2003-05 (BEING A BY-LAW TO REGULATE SMOKING IN PUBLIC PLACES AND WORKPLACES) (NORTH BAY REGIONAL HEALTH CENTRE)

WHEREAS section 115 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, 2001, S.O. c.25, as amended, authorizes the Council of a local municipality to pass a by-law to prohibit or regulate the smoking of tobacco in public places and workplaces within the municipality;

**AND WHEREAS** section 10(2) of the *Municipal Act* authorizes a municipality to pass bylaws respecting health, safety, and well-being of persons;

**AND WHEREAS** the Council has been asked by the North Bay District Health Unit ("NBDHU") and the Medical Officer of Health, as well as the Board of the North Bay Regional Health Center ("NBRHC") to pass this By-law;

**AND WHEREAS** section 12 of the *Smoke-Free Ontario Act*, S.O. 1994, c. 10, as amended, permits municipalities to enact smoking by-laws that are more restrictive than section 9 and 10 of the Act;

AND WHEREAS Council passed General Government Committee Report No. 2011-10 at its Regular Meeting on Monday, April 4, 2011, authorizing that a by-law be enacted to allow only patients to smoke on owned and solely leased NBRHC property using the two (2) designated smoking areas until July 1, 2011; as of July 1, 2011, all owned and solely leased NBRHC property will be 100% smoke-free.

# NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL FOR THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- That By-law 2003-05 is hereby amended to insert the following at the end of section 1.4:
  - ", or security staff designated by the North Bay Regional Health Centre and authorized by the City to act as agents of the City for the purpose of enforcing this By-law;"
- That By-law 2003-05 is hereby amended to add the following:
  - "1.14 North Bay Regional Health Center" ("NBRHC") means all owned and solely leased properties occupied by the North Bay General Hospital and the Northeast Mental Health Center, being the lands set out in Schedule "G";"
- That By-law 2003-05 is hereby amended to add the following:
  - "3.4 No person may smoke on the NBRHC property, except on the lands designated in Schedule "F" as temporary smoking areas."
  - 3.5 Patients shall only be permitted to smoke in the designated areas at the NBRHC, as identified in Schedule "F" of this By-law, until June 30, 2011.
  - 3.6 Effective July 1, 2011, no person shall be permitted to smoke at the NBRHC."
- 4. That By-law 2003-05 is hereby amended to add the following:
  - "10.2 Section 3.5 is effective until 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 2011, whereupon it shall be deemed to be repealed.

- 10.3 Section 3.6 shall come into force and effect as of July 1, 2011."
- 5. This By-law comes into force on the day it is enacted by Council.

- Any promissory note or notes issued pursuant to paragraph 2 hereof shall be sealed with the seal of The Corporation of the City of North Bay and signed by the Mayor or Deputy Mayor and the Treasurer of the City of North Bay.
- 4. That the debentures to be issued to pay for the cost of such work shall bear interest at such rate as the Council may determine and shall be made payable within ten (10) years.

#### A BY-LAW TO AMEND TRAFFIC & PARKING BY-LAW NO. 2002-001 (TO ALLOWTHE USE OF SEGWAYS ON CITY SIDEWALKS)

WHEREAS the Municipal Act, 2001, (S.O. 2001, c.25) authorizes the Council to pass By-Laws regulating or prohibiting certain traffic on highways and regulating or prohibiting parking on highways;

**AND WHEREAS** the *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter H-8, as amended, authorizes the Council to pass By-laws regulating traffic on highways;

AND WHEREAS the Council passed Resolution 2011-200 at its meeting held Monday, March 21, 2011, authorizing that the Traffic & Parking By-law No. 2002-001 be amended to allow the use of Segways on sidewalks in the City in compliance with Ontario Regulation 488/06 – Pilot Project Segways.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That Part 1 General Definitions of By-Law 2002-001 is hereby amended by adding the following:
  - "(jj) "Segway" means a device known as the Segway Personal Transporter or the Segway Human Transporter that is manufactured by Segway Inc."
- 2. That Part 2 Traffic Regulations of By-Law 2002-001 is hereby amended by adding the following:

#### "42. Segways:

- (1) Every person operating a Segway on a sidewalk:
  - shall give way to pedestrians or bicycles by slowing or stopping if there is insufficient space to pass;
  - (ii) shall not operate at a speed that is markedly greater than the speed of pedestrians who are proximate to the Segway; and
  - (iii) shall not operate it in such a manner that it may harm, injure or damage, either directly or indirectly, any person or property.
- (2) The operation of a Segway will only be allowed on a Municipal sidewalk from the period commencing May 1<sup>st</sup> to October 14<sup>th</sup> of each year.
- (3) No person shall operate a Segway unless,:
  - (i) they are 14 years old or older;
  - (ii) his or her ability is limited by one or more disabilities, conditions or functional impairments; and
  - (iii) they possess and produce a medical certificate from a doctor to certify that his or her mobility is limited.
- (4) No person shall operate a Segway unless it is equipped with a bell or horn.
- (5) Every person operating a Segway shall sound its horn whenever it is reasonably necessary to notify pedestrians or others of its approach.
- (6) Every person operating a Segway at any time from one-half hour before sunset to one-half hour after sunrise and at any other time when, due to insufficient light or unfavourable atmospheric conditions, persons and vehicles are not clearly discernible at a distance of 150 metres or less:



- shall carry a lighted lamp displaying a white or amber light at the front of the Segway and a lighted lamp displaying a red light at the rear of the Segway; and
- (ii) the lamps shall be attached to the Segway or shall be carried or worn by the operator on his or her person.
- (7) No person under 18 years of age shall ride on or operate a Segway while on a Municipal sidewalk unless the person is wearing a helmet that complies with the regulations under the *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8 and the chin strap of the helmet is securely fastened under the chin.
- (8) No parent or guardian of a person under 16 years of age shall authorize or knowingly permit that person to ride on or operate a Segway on a Municipal sidewalk unless the person is wearing a helmet that complies with the regulations under the *Highway Traffic Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8 and the chin strap of the helmet is securely fastened under the chin.

- That certain parcel of land on Francis Street, known locally as Concession B, Part of Lot 19, Parcel 3243 in the former Township of Widdifield, representing lands included in the Francis Street Subdivision (File #48T-06101), which lands are more particularly described on Schedule "A" attached hereto, is hereby designated as a Site Plan Control Area.
- 2) As a condition of approval, the Owner shall:
  - a) Provide fencing along the rear lot line of Lots 1, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11; and along the westerly side yard of Lots 4 and 5;
  - b) Provide a lot grading plan to the satisfaction of the City Engineer to establish the location and placement of fill on Lots 1, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10; and
  - c) Provide a retaining wall along the easterly side yard of Lot 1.
- 3) a) The Chief Administrative Officer is hereby authorized to enter into, under Corporate Seal, one or more agreements on behalf of The Corporation of the City of North Bay with the owner of the subject lands herein to ensure the provision of all the facilities mentioned in this By-law, and to impose a fee of \$1,100 upon the owner for preparation.

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b) The said Agreement may be registered against the lands to which it applies and the City may enforce the provisions of the Registry Act or any successor legislation thereto and The Land Titles Act or any successor legislation thereto against any and all subsequent owners of the land.

- 4) a) The said Agreement shall be binding on the owner, its successors, assigns and heirs.
  - b) The owner shall authorize the City to exercise the provisions of Section 446 of The Municipal Act, 2001 (S.O. 2001, c.25), as amended or any successor legislation thereto in the event of a breach by the owner of a condition of this agreement.

  - c) Where one or more notices of appeal are filed with the Clerk of The Corporation of the City of North Bay within twenty (20) days after the day that the giving of written notice as required by the Act is completed, setting out the objection to the By-law and the reasons in support of the objection, then this By-law shall not come into force until all appeals have been finally disposed of, whereupon the By-law shall be deemed to have come into force on the day it was passed.





#### A BY-LAW TO AMEND ZONING BY-LAW NO. 28-80 TO REZONE CERTAIN LANDS ON LAKESHORE DRIVE FROM A "RESIDENTIAL THIRD DENSITY (R3)" ZONE TO A "RESIDENTIAL THIRD DENSITY SPECIAL ZONE NO. 125 (R3 SP. 125)"

#### (2221864 ONTARIO INC. – 482 LAKESHORE DRIVE)

WHEREAS the owner of the subject property has initiated an amendment to the Zoning By-law;

**AND WHEREAS** the Council of The Corporation of the City of North Bay has ensured that adequate information has been made available to the public, and has held at least one public meeting after due notice for the purpose of informing the public of this By-law;

**AND WHEREAS** it is deemed desirable to amend the zoning designation shown on Schedules "B-70" and "B-71" of By-law No. 28-80 pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act R.S.O. 1990, as amended.

AND WHEREAS Council passed a resolution on April 4th, 2011 to approve this rezoning.

### NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1) Schedules "B-70" and "B-71" of By-law No. 28-80 is amended by changing the zoning designation of the property shown on Schedule "A" attached hereto, which property is more particularly described as Concession 16, Part of Lot 20, Parcel 1357 WF, PIN #49174-0060(LT) along Lakeshore Drive in the City of North Bay from a "Residential Third Density (R3)" zone to a "Residential Third Density Special Zone No. 125 (R3 Sp. 125)".
- Section 11 of By-law No. 28-80 is amended by inserting at the end thereof the following "Section 11.2.125:
  - 11.2.125 Residential Third Density Special No. 125 (R3 Sp. 125)
  - The property description of this "Residential Third Density Special Zone No.
    (R3 Sp. 125)" is Concession 16, Part of Lot 20, Parcel 1357 WF, PIN #49174-0060(LT) along Lakeshore Drive in the City of North Bay as shown on the attached Schedules and on Schedules "B-70" and "B-71".
  - 11.2.125.2 The regulations for this "Residential Third Density Special Zone No. 125 (R3 Sp. 125)" are as follows:
    - i) The minimum lot frontage shall be 13.3 meters.

until all appeals have been finally disposed of, whereupon the By-law shall be

deemed to have come into force on the day it was passed.




