

Curbside Collection Practices

Please place garbage and recyclables at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day, and no earlier than 6:00 p.m. the night before.

Maximum of two garbage bags or containers per week. Max weight of 15kg (35lbs) each. Containers shall not be larger than 150L (33 gal). Do not tie down garbage can lids (ex: bungee cords).

Items not picked up at the curb include: household hazardous waste, syringes, car parts, tires, liquid waste, electronics, furniture, biomedical waste, mattresses and grass clippings.

Corrugated cardboard is banned from the landfill and must be recycled. Cardboard boxes can not be used as garbage receptacles.

Yard waste placed at the curb will not get composted.

Please bring these to the Organic Drop-Off Depot at 112 Patton Street or to the landfill for proper composting.









Blue Box Tips

Placing your blue box at the curb signals the driver to stop. Place it at least 1 meter (39 inches) from your regular garbage so it can be easily seen.

To assist curbside sorting efficiency, residents are asked to group similar blue box items together.

Blue boxes are available at the Household Hazardous Waste Depot and at City Hall Customer Service Center for purchase (\$5.00 each). Call for availability.

Do not use bags to hold recyclables. Use your blue box which has a lip to attach to the recycling truck to assist with curbside sorting. Large non-blue box containers will not be accepted. No containers with wheels or without a special lip.

To avoid mix-ups, print your address on the side of your blue box.

Merrick Landfill Located on Sand Dam Road in Merrick Township, off HWY 11 North (26km from City Hall).

The City of North Bay owns and operates the Merrick Landfill Site, an engineered waste management facility. All household, industrial, commercial, and institutional solid non-hazardous wastes generated within the City of North Bay are accepted at the Site (with certain restrictions listed below) and are managed responsibly in order to minimizes impacts on the surrounding environment. All fees collected on Site are used to support the operation and management of the City's waste management facilities.

Changes to Bag Limit!

Bag limit will be reduced to two bags per household as of Jan. 1, 2022.

Starting in the new year, the weekly garbage limit will change from three bags/containers per residential household per week to **two bags/containers per household per week**. The maximum weight for each bag/container is 15 kg (35lbs), each. Containers shall not be larger than 150 L (33 gal.).

This change is aimed at helping to protect the environment by increasing recycling within the community and diverting more waste from the municipal landfill, thereby extending the life of the facility.

GARBAGE BAG TAGS

When you have more bags than the permitted limit, you can buy tags. In addition to the two allowable bags at the curb, residents may place four additional **tagged bags** out for pick up per week.

WHERE TO BUY GARBAGE BAG TAGS

City garbage bag tags can be purchased at City Hall Customer Service Center for \$1.00 per tag.

HOW TO USE BAG TAGS

Use one bag tag for each garbage bag or receptacle over the allowable limit of two (2) bags/receptacles.



USING A BAG TAG ON A GARBAGE BAG:

- Secure top of garbage bag with a twist tie or knot.
- Attach bag tag above the knot, on the neck of the bag. Do not use tags as a twist tie.
- Ensure tag has adhesive ends pressed tightly together and the full tag can be seen.



USING A BAG TAG ON A GARBAGE CAN:

- Do not place the bag tag on the garbage container itself.
- Place the bag tag on the top bag inside the garbage container.
- Make sure the bag tag is clearly visible when the collector opens the lid.
- Only one tag on the top bag for the entire container to be collected as long as it is no larger than 150 L (33 gal) and weighs no more than 15 kg (35 lbs).

Waste collectors will not accept bags/receptacles with torn tags. You must bring garbage that can't be bagged or placed in a container that is 150 L (33 gal) to the Merrick Landfill.

Zero Waste – It's Easy to Start!

While recycling is one way to divert waste, Zero Waste living means to live conscientiously with a plan to acquire products in a way that eliminates the need for packaging. Many of us are already doing some form of this now. Something as simple as using a cloth grocery bag can save 10 or more plastic bags per weeks and could be the first step to living a zero waste lifestyle!



Tips to get started:

- Buy produce without packaging and use reusable produce bags
- Buy items in bulk and bring your own reusable jars and bags!
 Things like shampoo, lotions, oils, dry goods including cereals, nut butters, and honey can all be purchased LOCALLY in bulk!
- Switch to cloth diapers and wipes

- Keep a zero waste kit with you (fork, knife, spoon, straw, and bottle)
- Bring your own containers when buying fresh meats, fish and cheeses
- · Use bar soaps, shampoos and conditioners
- Swap disposable pads and tampons for cloth pads and menstrual cups

By purchasing higher quality, timeless garments, either direct from retailers or second hand, you stand to reduce the turnover in your closet. This saves you money in buying less often and reduces textile waste since higher quality clothing should last you longer!

Give Old Clothes a New Life by turning your unwanted textiles into something new for yourself or someone else! Some examples include:

- Donate to local reuse stores and animal shelters
- Cut fabrics up for quilting
- · Give away as Hand-me-downs

Grasscycling: Your lawn will love it!

Leaving grass clippings on your lawn returns much-needed moisture and nutrients to the soil. Cut properly, clippings are virtually unnoticeable and generally disappear within three days.

Studies show that grasscycling can reduce fertilizer requirements by as much as 30%. It helps the soil retain valuable moisture, and helps to choke out weeds by denying light and air to them and improving your lawn's weed resistance.

Best of all, think of the time and effort you'll save when you don't have to bag and dispose of clippings!

Tips for successful grasscycling:

- Set your mower high to 2.5 inches (6 cm).
- · Keep your mower blade(s) sharp.
- Take care to cut no more than one-third of the grass blade height at a time.
- Mow frequently to produce small clippings which will decompose faster.
- · Mow when the lawn is dry to prevent clumping.

Organic Drop-off Depot

Bring your yard waste to the Organic Drop-off Depot located at 112 Patton Street. Hours of operation: Monday to Saturday – 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Open from April to November.

Accepted Materials:

- Grass Cuttings
- Leaves
- Sod
- Flower Clippings

Not Accepted:

- Brush of Any Size
- Milled Wood/Pressure Treated Wood
- Plastic Bags
- Garbage

This service is **free of charge for residential households.** Businesses will be subject to disposal fees.

Brush is only accepted at the Merrick Landfill (charges apply). Free brush drop-off at the Merrick Landfill is from May 2nd to June 11th. (See page 3 for additional information).

DID YOU KNOW: The organic material collected at the Depot is converted into compost which is then sold to the public at a very low cost! This allows The City of North Bay to maintain this program!

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

Chemical waste is both dangerous and harmful to humans, animals, and the environment. NEVER throw hazardous waste into the garbage or flush it down the sink, toilet, or storm sewer.

Hours of Operation:

Wednesday to Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Open Year Round

Bring all your HHW and electronic waste to the Hazardous Waste/Electronic Drop-Off Depot at 112 Patton St. This service is **free** to North Bay residents.

Hours of operation (year round): Wednesday to Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Accepted Materials:

- Adhesives/glues
- Batteries (all types)
- Cosmetics
- Fuels
- Pesticides
- Propane (all sizes)

- Aerosols
- Cleaning supplies
- Fire extinguishers
- Oil and oil filters
- Pharmaceuticals
- Sharps*

- Antifreeze
- · Cooking oil
- Fluorescent lights
- · Paint, varnishes and stains
- Pool chemicals



NOT ACCEPTED: Unidentified items, items with refrigerants (AC units, fridges, freezers, water coolers, dehumidifiers), PCB's, explosives, biological/pathological waste, radioactive waste.

Disposing of Sharps*: Please put sharps in a sharps approved container. You can acquire a sharps approved container at your local pharmacy, free of charge. You can also place them in a container and tape the lid of the container shut and label sharps on the container. Bring them to the pharmacy or to the Hazardous Waste Depot.

There are limits to how much waste you can bring per trip.

DO NOT BRING MORE THAN 60 LITERS AT A TIME!

Deleting E-Waste

E-waste is the fastest growing source of waste in North America.

As faster, smaller and more powerful computer equipment, phones, televisions, stereos, and small home appliances are introduced, current models quickly become obsolete. Don't throw them away; bring them to the **Electronic Drop Off** site at 112 Patton Street, **Wednesday to Saturday**, 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. all year round.

Lead, cadmium and mercury are found in most electronic equipment, increasing risks to human health and the environment if they are not properly managed.

Help keep e-waste products out of landfills by:

- Upgrading or repairing products instead of replacing them.
- Donating old equipment to a family member, friend or charity.
- Checking if the manufacturer or vendor participates in a take-back or recycling program for their products. If not, encourage them to start one!
- Checking if there is a location in your community that accepts old computer equipment for refurbishing.
- Learning about reuse, recycling and disposal options for electronics in your area.

Responsible Waste Hauling

Sometimes people have waste that cannot reasonably be placed at the curb for weekly pick up. Before making the trip to the Merrick Landfill to dispose of excess waste materials, it is important to consider the safest, most convenient and most cost effective way to transport the waste.



If transporting waste to the landfill in your personal vehicle or trailer, ensure that the waste is appropriately secured inside and outside of your vehicle such that materials will not be ejected from the load causing extremely dangerous conditions for other drivers on the road.

When you have too much waste to take yourself, consider hiring a waste hauler to safely deliver your items to the landfill.

A note on illegal dumping

Illegal dumping occurs when waste is dumped in an area that is not an approved disposal facility. Everyone loses when waste is dumped illegally. Every year tax dollars are spent investigating and cleaning up illegally dumped waste in order to prevent resulting damage to the environment and public health. Ensure that you are working with a responsible hauler, ask questions!

Sharps and Medications - Take Them Back!

Responsibly return unused and expired medications



It is so important to check your home regularly for medications that are expired or no longer needed.

You can return:

- All prescription medications
- Over the counter drugs (Tylenol, cough syrup)
- Natural health products
- Inhalers

Disposing of them properly can prevent misuse, accidental ingestion and protect the environment in the process. Safely store medications in your home.



Check for unused and expired medications.



Empty all pills into a bag or container, but keep liquids, creams and inhalers in their original packaging. Remove any personal identification. Recycle all other packaging.



Take it back to a participating pharmacy.

Responsibly return used sharps to prevent injuries

Visit your local participating pharmacy to receive an approved sharp container free of charge.
Once you have your container follow these steps:

- Recap needles and drop or place into an approved sharp container. DO NOT OVERFILL.
- 2. When ready to return, permanently close the container by inserting the tab into the opening to secure the lid down.
- 3. Take back the secured container to the pharmacy or the North Bay Household Hazardous Waste Depot.

SAFELY DISPOSE OF YOUR USED SHARPS DEVICES BY FOLLOWING THESE STEPS:





Visit any participating pharmacy to receive an approved sharps container, free of charge.





Place your used sharps into the container, needle tip first.



Once the sharps waste has reached the designated fill line, secure the latch (double click) and return to a participating pharmacy.

Always use an approved sharps container when disposing of used sharps to help reduce the risk of needlestick injuries.

Thank you for doing your part in protecting the environment and the health and safety of those around you.

The Dirt on Composting

Composting is a natural process in which organic materials decompose and become a nutrient-rich soil amendment.

Your lawn and garden will love it.

Composting aids erosion control, promotes soil fertility, and stimulates healthy root development. Plus it cuts down on valuable waste going to landfills. Composting can take 3 to 18 months depending upon how well the pile is maintained. Compost is ready when its texture is crumbly and it has a pleasant, earthy smell.

Tips for successful composting:

- · Keep your compost pile moist bu not wet.
- Aerate by turing it occasionally.
- Avoid thick layers of any one material, such as grass.
- Layer "brown" materials (e.g. dried leaves, dead plants, and shredded newspaper) with "green" materials (e.g. plant trimmings, and fruit and vegetable peels and cores).
- A one-inch (2.5 cm) layer of finished compost or garden soil spread on top of kitchen scraps will speed things up.
- Bury fruit and vegetable trimmings at least 6 inches (15 cm) deep.
- Smaller pieces decompose faster.
- Never add meat, fish or dairy items.
- Compost during winter. The freezing and thawing process helps to beak down materials.

Leave Those Leaves

Mulched or shredded leaves are an excellent source of nutrients for your lawn and garden. Mulch helps retain moisture by reducing soil exposure to the sun and slowing evaporation. It chokes out weeds, too.

For best results, shred leaves when they are dry.

Push your mower slowly over areas where there are lots of leaves; you may have to run over them twice. Only a sharp mower blade is necessary, but a mulching blade available from your local hardware or garden store can make the job easier.
