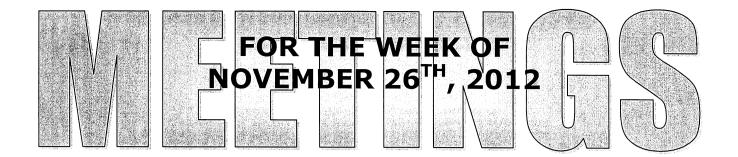

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the City of North Bay ask the Premier of the Province of Ontario, the Honourable Dalton McGuinty to immediately suspend plans to divest from ONTC and consult with local municipalities, stakeholders and regional economic development organizations regarding the long-term plans for improving the effectiveness of ONTC as a government asset

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That City Council receive the 2013 General Capital Budget (Schedule A) and the 2013 Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital Budget (Schedule B), and refer the documents to the General Government Committee.

BACKGROUND:

The attached proposed 2013 General Capital Budget and 2013 Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital Budget, with the 2014 to 2022 Ten-Year Capital Forecasts, have been prepared after Senior Management Team meetings and are recommended for adoption by City Council.

The annual Capital Budget review meeting of the aforementioned budgets is scheduled to take place at the Committee Meeting on December 3, 2012. The proposed agenda is as follows:

- Presentation of Capital Project Highlights by Business Unit staff
- Review of projects requested by Mayor and Councillors .
 - Please contact Margaret Karpenko to identify the projects you wish to have discussed in greater detail. There will not be a line-by-line review of the capital projects; only those requested for review will be discussed. At the start of the meeting, the Deputy Mayor will ask if there are any additions to the list of projects to be reviewed.

Long-Term Capital Funding Policies approved amendments

Report to Council CORP 2012-137 dated October 17, 2012, adopted by Council recommended the following changes to the Long-Term Capital Funding Policy:

- City Council approves a one million (\$1,000,000) one-time baseline adjustment to the pay as you go amount in the 2013 Capital and Operating Budgets; and
- City Council approves the Long-Term Capital Funding Policy amended with annual new debt being held at nine million (\$9,000,000).

KECEIVED CITY OF NORTH BAY The Water and Sanitary Sewer Operating Budget being forwarded to City Council after reviews with the General Government Committee and the Engineering, Environmental Services and Works Committee recommends a one time reduction of \$311,000 in the Pay-as-you-go amount in the 2013 Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital and Operating Budgets.

These recommended changes in the Long-Term Capital Funding Policies have been used to develop the 2013 Capital Budgets.

Capital Reserves & On-going Project Funding Status

The current Reserve balances consist of monies set aside for Capital, Operating, Tax Stabilization, Contingencies and Obligatory funds. The Reserve Policy states that the Capital Reserves target is equal to 40% of the yearly Capital Expenditure Limit outlined in the 'Capital' and 'Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital' Budgets.

The analysis demonstrates that the current Reserve levels are below the Reserve Policy targeted level for Capital Reserves and balances may not be sufficient should a major emergency require Reserve funding.

On-going capital project funding has been moving towards a balance between 'committed project' balances and 'funded project' balances as reported in the Semi-Annual Capital Project Status Reports. We have made a great effort over the past years to achieve this goal. As per the June 30, 2012 Capital Project Status Report, committed projects yet to be funded amount to \$4,660,528. These projects will be completed and funded in future years. Any projects initiated after June 30, 2012 and unfunded until future years will affect this amount. The primary goals of the aforementioned policy amendments are to reduce this amount of committed versus funded to a level below two million.

Presentation of Capital Project Highlights by Business Unit Staff

City staff will be making a presentation summarizing the most significant capital projects included in 2013 and the forecasted ten-year period. Following the presentation, questions identified by the Mayor and Council will be addressed.

Concerns and Issues

A 2012 State of the Infrastructure Report filed with City Council on October 15, 2012 (EW 2012-04) outlined the required level of funding to replace, rehabilitate and maintain the existing infrastructure networks at a sustainable level for a timeframe more than one typical lifecycle. Sustainability means having sufficient funding available to ensure that assets can be managed over the long-term. The report documented that the City of North Bay currently has an estimated 'annual' funding shortfall of \$ 13.3 Million (based on 2012 figures) for the City's water, sewer, water and sewer plants and roadway '*linear*' infrastructure. This figure does not include any capital investment gap for buildings, facilities, parks, parking lots, trails, vehicles, and equipment.

This report is an update of the original report prepared in 2008. Since then it shows that the annual funding shortfall has been reduced, an indication that the City's plan to invest more in infrastructure has moved the City a little closer to sustainability. Council resolved that the report be accepted and to work towards maintaining increased capital budgets over time through further development of an Asset Management Program. Council recognized by not making a commitment, there would be a requirement to dramatically increase future operating budgets in order to react to more frequent emergency repairs and/or increased regular maintenance on fully depreciated infrastructure.

If the proposed 2013 General Capital Budget and 2013 Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital Budget are recommended for adoption at the Committee Meeting on December 3, 2012, it will provide the authority for capital by-law preparation and the tendering and awarding of contracts. Earlier tendering should allow for better competitive bidding and scheduling of work for the 2013 construction season.

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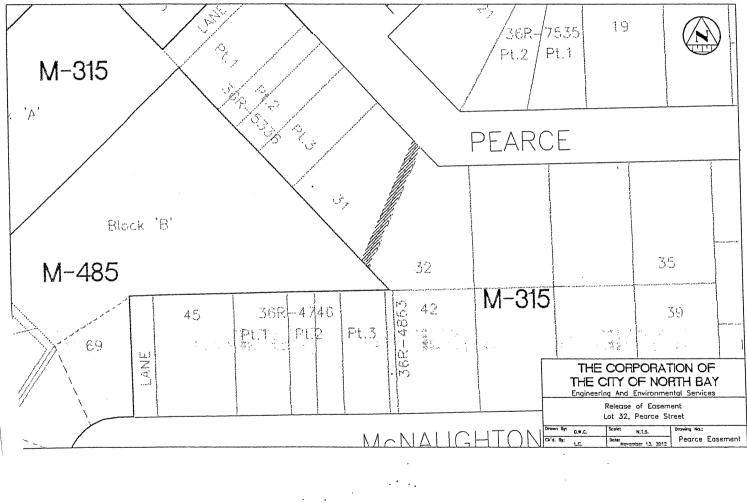

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the Subdivision Agreement with Laurentian Heights Limited for Surrey Drive Phase 2 to support the creation of five (5) lots; and
- 2. That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the Final Plan of Subdivision subject to receipt of all security, easements and all other Subdivision Agreement requirements.

BACKGROUND

Exp. Services Inc. on behalf of Laurentian Heights Ltd. is seeking Final Approval of the Surrey Drive (Phase 2) Plan of Subdivision in order to create five (5) single detached dwelling lots on the south side of Surrey Drive in the City of North Bay.

Council has previously authorized the Final Approval of sixty-three (63) lots. The approval of this phase of the subdivision will bring that total Final Approved Registered Lots in the Laurentian Heights Plan of Subdivision to sixty-eight (68) lots. The requested approval is for Phase 2 of Surrey Drive for five (5) lots approximately 290m east of Mapleview Drive to approximately 430m east of Mapleview Drive.

The final approval being requested is within the boundary of the lands that have been given Draft Approval. The Laurentian Heights Plan of Subdivision was given Draft Approval by Council on October 20th, 1997.

All municipal services have been installed to the satisfaction of the City Engineering in 2011 / 2012.

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS

It should be noted the applicant appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board, Condition #9 of the original Draft Approval with respect to Parkland Dedication. A decision with respect to this appeal was issued by the OMB on June 28, 2012. As a result of that decision, the City negotiated and entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Laurentian Heights Limited that will see the parkland dedicated to the City on a phased basis. Council approved the MOU through Report to Council CSBU 2012-73.

Prior to Staff recommending the City enter into a Subdivision Agreement and giving Final Approval, Staff required the developer satisfy the conditions of Draft Approval. The developer has satisfied the Conditions of Draft Approval for the requested five (5) lot phase on Surrey Drive as follows:

- 1) The Subdivision Agreement has been prepared and is recommended for approval by the Managing Director, Engineering, Environmental Services & Public Works;
- The Final Plan (Registered 36M Plan) has been prepared for registration upon Council approval. It has been reviewed and found to conform with the original Draft Approval; and
- 3) The conditions imposed when Draft Approval was given have been satisfied for Surrey Drive, Phase 2 (5 lots).

RECOMMENDED OPTION/FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Developer, in conjunction with his consultants, has prepared a Subdivision Agreement to the satisfaction of City Staff. The owner has satisfied the conditions of Draft Approval for the requested phase, and it is now appropriate to give Final Approval to Surrey Drive, Phase 2 (5 lots).

Therefore, it is recommended that Surrey Drive, Phase 2 (5 lots) be given Final Approval, and the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the Final Plan of Subdivision subject to receipt of all security, easements, acknowledgements and subdivision agreements.

Option 1:

Deny the request to enter into the Subdivision Agreement and grant Final Approval.

<u>Option 2</u>:

Approve the request to enter into the Subdivision Agreement and grant Final Approval.

Option 2 is recommended for the above noted reasons.

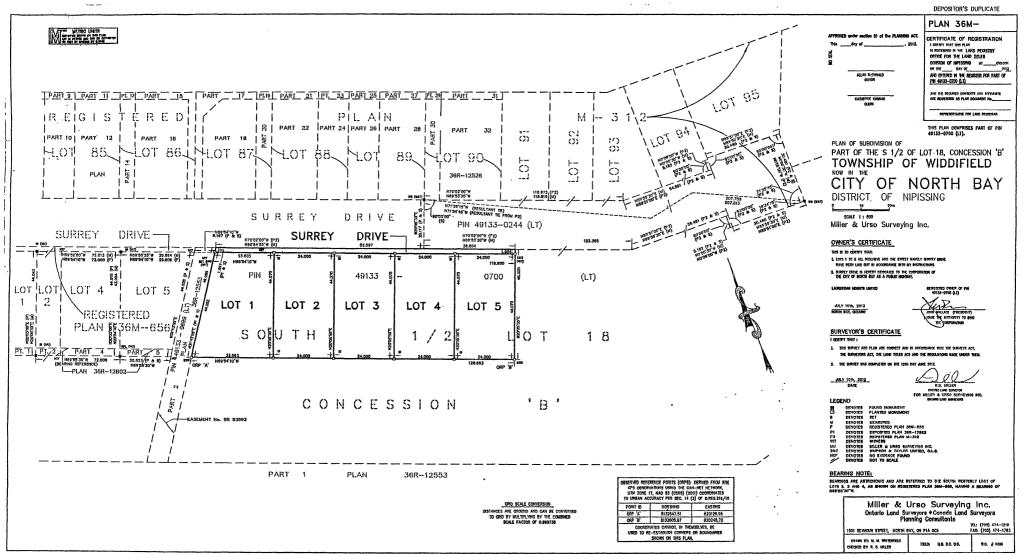

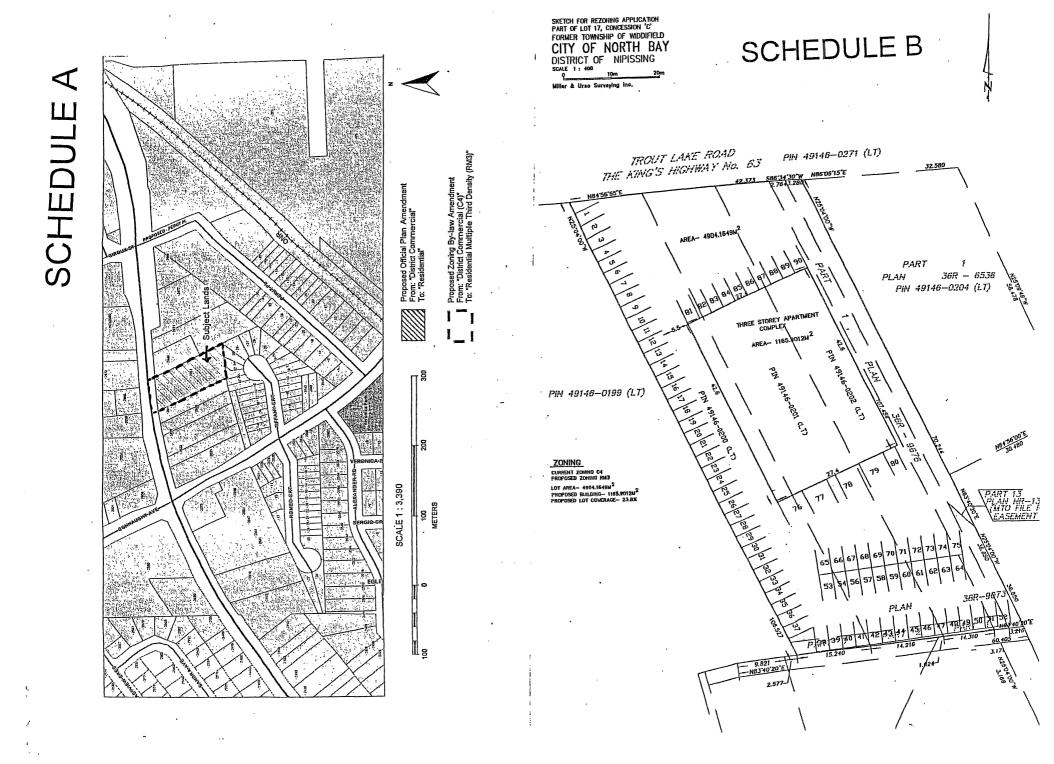

Subject: 2013 Administration Recommended Operating Budget

RECOMMENDATION:

That the 2013 Administration Recommended Operating Budget be received and referred to the General Government Committee.

BACKGROUND:

During October 2012, the Business Unit Managing Directors and their management teams met with the Chief Administrative Officer, the Chief Financial Officer and the Supervisor of Budgets and Financial Reporting to review their 2013 Preliminary Operating Budget submissions.

Adjustments were made and the attached is a summary of the proposed **Administration Recommended** 2013 Operating Budget.

Budget Development Guidelines

The 2013 Administration Recommended Operating Budget was prepared with the following guidelines:

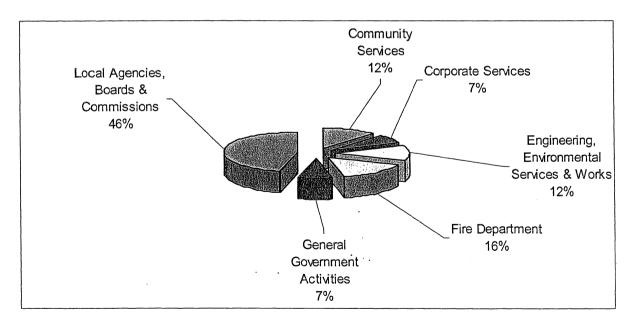
- <u>Service Levels</u>: The preliminary budget was prepared with the assumption that all services and programs would generally remain at the 2012 levels.
- **Expenditures:** Represent management's best estimates to continue to provide the same programs and levels of service as approved in the 2012 Operating Budget. Management estimates include:
 - o Annualized approved Council initiatives or partial items within the 2012
 - Operating Budget
 - o Inclusion of contractual agreements
 - o Known revenue reductions
 - o Legislated changes that came into effect
- <u>Staff Complement</u>: Changes to staff complement would be presented through service levels changes; therefore, the base Administrative Recommended Operating Budget represents staffing levels as approved in the 2012 Operating Budget and includes any approved amendments made during 2012.
- <u>User Fees</u>: User fees have been calculated in accordance with a study or prior approvals of Council. Any new user fees would be proposed as an enhancement.

Page 2

- <u>Fringe Benefits</u>: All staff benefit costs have been calculated by the Finance Department and are reflected within the department that the individual works.
- <u>Utility Costs</u>: Finance obtained rate estimates from North Bay Hydro and other utility experts. The projections take into consideration the prior year's actual and expected future trends. Calculations, therefore, take into consideration the benefit of energy efficiencies gained through capital investments or enhanced education programs to improve conservation.
- <u>Revenue Estimates</u>: These estimates are based on current trends, current rates and current approved rate increases.
- <u>Local Agencies, Boards and Commissions:</u> An estimated 2.5% increase has been included for those Local Agencies, Boards and Commissions where 2013 operating budgets have as yet been received.

As with any budget, there are risks associated with forecasting expenditures and revenues. Many municipal expenditures are non-discretionary; therefore, impacts from factors such as assessment appeals, fuel costs, permit revenues, etc. may significantly impact net municipal costs increasing the risk of future budget variances. The tabled budget contains a contingency account of \$50,000 that may somewhat mitigate the aforementioned risks.

Below is a graph demonstrating how the net tax levy supported budget is divided by business unit. The total net expenditure amount is \$76.2 million. Detailed summary of budget changes are provided in Schedules A - F.



The Administration Recommended Operating Budget, as presented, would require a tax levy increase of **\$2,407,356 or 3.26%**. The major items accounting for this increase are as follows:

• Business Units increasing by \$1,409,858 or 4.13% resulting from: estimated wage increases, \$1,083,000; increases to employee benefit plans, \$544,000; higher fuel and vehicle maintenance costs, \$154,000; higher street light electricity costs, \$148,000 and higher insurance premiums, \$68,000 partially offset by higher transit, sportsfields and parking operations revenues, (\$204,000); revenues generated from sale of methane gas, (\$200,000), higher fleet revenues, (\$144,000).

- To more accurately reflect the total City employee complement, a change in \circ reporting was implemented for the 2013 Operating Budget. Total wage related costs for employees involved in capital project activities is included in the appropriate departmental operating budget with an offsetting internal revenue transfer from Capital funds. As a result of this reporting change, the increase in wage and benefit costs is partially offset by a transfer from the Capital Fund (\$136,000).
- General Government Activities increasing by \$400,073 or 7.82% resulting from: lower use of reserve funds, \$170,000; reduction in the Ontario Municipal Partnership Funding, \$120,500; and higher salary costs resulting from the hiring of the Junior Assessment and Real Estate Specialist, \$52,100. The Provincial budget presented earlier this year announced a reduction in the total funding envelope for OMPF. The announcement highlights that the funding envelope would be reduced from \$598 million in 2012 to \$575 million in 2013 and further, that over the next 4 years there will be an annual decline of approximately \$25 million per year. It was also communicated that the funding envelope would include all transition and reconciliation dollars. Based on this announcement, the City of North Bay had a potential for a \$300,000 reduction in OMPF.

On November 15, 2012 the 2013 OMPF allocations were released along with a different calculation called the 2013 Transition Year Stable Funding Allocation. The formula used is based on a percent of the 2012 allocation and then is scaled based on Municipal Fiscal Circumstances Index (MFCI) measures and weights. The approach guaranteed Northern Communities 95% of their 2012 allocation plus an adjustment based on the outcome of the MFCI measures. The MFCI measures are as follows:

- Primary Indicators Weighted average assessment per household and Median household income
- Secondary Indicators Unemployment Rates, Average Annual Change in 0 Assessment (new construction), ratio of working aged to dependent population and percent of population above low-income threshold

Application of this approach resulted in the City of North Bay receiving its guaranteed 95% plus a bump up of 3.6% for the MFCI measures. Therefore, the City is receiving 98.6% of the 2012 allocation. The amount included in this budget represents the 2013 final allocation of \$8.4 million, a reduction of \$120,500.

Local Agencies, Boards and Commissions increasing by \$597,425 or 1.73%. District of Nipissing Social Services Administration Board is projecting a 0% budget increase; North Bay / Parry Sound District Health Unit is projecting a 2% budget increase; an estimate of 2.50% budget increase has been used for all other Local Agencies, Boards and Commissions where 2013 budgets are yet to be received.

The projected assessment base real growth for 2012 is estimated at .33% which will effectively reduce the required tax levy increase down to 2.93%.

That the 2013 Administration Recommended Operating Budget be received and referred to the General Government Committee.

A staff presentation will provide an overview of the 2013 **Committee Recommended** Operating Budget and will identify the major impacts, both positive and negative.

Attached is a copy of the **2013 Operating Budget Review Schedule** as approved by the Chair of the General Government Committee.

The final budget recommendations are scheduled to be considered at the regular General Government Committee Meeting on Monday, March 11th, 2013 and adopted at the regular Council Meeting on Tuesday, April 2nd, 2013.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City of North Bay's Water and Sanitary Sewer Year-end Financial Projection for the period ending September 30, 2012 be received and filed.

BACKGROUND:

The City of North Bay 2012 Water and Sanitary Sewer Year-end Financial Projection, as at September 30, 2012, is attached. It highlights year-end financial projections for each of the divisions and associated cost centers. To provide a snapshot of operations, year-to-date actuals are provided as at September 30, 2012. The variance between the **approved budget** and the **projected year-end** values conservatively indicate that the City would show a potential **deficit of (\$101,304)**.

Management reviews their cost centers' activities on an on-going basis and makes adjustments or reallocations of resources to ensure departments realize all possible savings and efficiencies. Along with Management's continual review, the CAO issued a directive for a discretionary spending freeze as of October 30th to the end of the year. Given these initiatives and the conservative nature of estimates used, the City is expected to end the year **on budget**.

The current variance between the **approved budget** and the **projected year-end** values are summarized as follows:

Sanitary Sewer Distribution is currently reporting a year-end surplus of \$15,597. A lower capital levy transfer, lower allocated salary and benefit costs along with some lower goods and services costs are partially offset by lower revenues and higher principal and interest payments.

Sanitary Sewer Plant is currently reporting a year-end deficit of (\$202,807). The plant's operations are actually on target, however due to unbudgeted municipal taxes and additional insurance costs, a deficit is projected to be realized.

Water Distribution is currently reporting a year-end **deficit of (\$25,444).** Higher fleet usage, allocated salary and benefits, goods and services, and maintenance costs are partially offset by lower principal and interest payments.

Water Plant is currently reporting a year-end surplus of \$111,350. Lower allocated salary and benefits, insurance, and some goods and services costs impact the projected surplus.

Two significant items which were not included in the 2012 approved operating budget include municipal taxes of \$117,016 and additional insurance premium costs of \$48,969. These challenges are expected to be offset by reduced operating capital dollars as part of the discretionary spending freeze directive.

In addition, note that the Water and Sanitary Sewer crews are allocated to water, sewer and storm activities as required throughout the year. Because of the allocation being directly linked to needs, there may be variations from budget to actuals within specific departments, but on the whole labour costs remain consistent.

On-going demands on the Water and Sanitary Sewer budget partially stem from the following:

- Increasing Utility Costs Historical trends along with some guidance from Utility companies are used to project future utility budgets, however many variables effect actual utility costs and there is always a risk that variances will be realized between budgets and actual costs.
- Unforeseen Issues/Emergencies to Necessary Services Due to the nature of the department, any Water and Sanitary Sewer issues/emergencies that arise must be dealt with in a timely manner to maintain necessary services to residents. It is impossible to anticipate the number of these occurrences. At the time of this report, 2012 was proceeding as expected; however, it is unknown what pressures the remaining year could hold.

OPTIONS:

Option # 1 – Report received and filed. Accept the report as presented. No action is required at this time.

RECOMMENDED OPTION / FINANCIAL OVERVIEW:

Given the current projection that the City's overall operations will end 2012 on budget, **Option #1** is being recommended at this time.

The 2012 Approved Water and Sanitary Sewer Operating Budget represented management's educated projections using trend analysis and business expertise. Despite best efforts, projected targets may not be met due to various factors beyond the City's control. Budgetary challenges have been listed in this report.

The Financial Services and Engineering, Environmental and Works departments will continue to monitor the cost centers and work closely to ensure spending remains under control and all possible savings are realized.

In response to the current year-end projections for the Water and Sanitary Sewer Department, the City's CAO has implemented a discretionary spending freeze in order to support Management's efforts to eliminate the potential deficit.

Due to the establishment of the Reserves, the City finds itself in a sound financial position to absorb any operational deficits should the need arise. Through Water and Sanitary Sewer

Reserves (#99576R & 99577R), the City has at its disposal on the date of this report, \$401,767 to offset any annual expenditure overages or revenue deficits.

The final position of the Water and Sewer Department will be determined after December 31st, 2012.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City of North Bay's Year-end Financial Projection for the period ending September 30, 2012 be received and filed.

BACKGROUND:

The City of North Bay's 2012 Year-end Financial Projection, as at September 30, 2012, is attached. It highlights year-end financial projections for each of the **Business Units**, **General Government Activities**, and the **Local Agencies**, **Boards and Commissions**.

As of September 30th, each cost center and business unit has been reviewed in detail by the Financial Services Department, Business Unit Managers and Managing Directors, in order to provide the most comprehensive year-end projections possible. To provide a snapshot of operations year-to-date actuals are provided. The variance between the **approved budget** and the **projected year-end** values conservatively indicates that the City would show a potential deficit of (\$80,482), which represents far less than 1% of the total \$111,568,033 gross approved operating budget.

Management reviews their cost centers' activities on an on-going basis and makes adjustments or reallocations of resources to ensure departments realize all possible savings and efficiencies. Along with Management's continual review, the CAO issued a directive for a discretionary spending freeze as of October 30th to the end of the year. Given these initiatives and the conservative nature of estimates used, the City is expected to end the year **on budget**.

The variance between the approved budget and the projected year-end values are resulting from:

Community Services currently showing a year-end **deficit of (\$170,220).** Higher transit fuel, overall utilities, and sick leave costs are partially offset by higher parking and planning revenues.

Corporate Services currently showing a year-end **surplus of \$39,328**. Numerous overall minor cost savings are partially offset by higher wages (due to retirements) and arbitration costs along with lower permit, license, and other revenues.

Engineering, Environmental Services and Works currently showing a year-end **surplus of \$37,599**. Higher fleet usage and blue box sales revenues are partially offset by higher fuel costs along with lower tipping fee revenues.

In order to negate the effect of higher street lighting costs due to the delay in the LED conversion, the capital project was charged for the lost energy savings that would have been realized if the conversion project had been completed on schedule. This results in \$130,000 of electricity costs being charged to the LED conversion capital project in 2012. The conversion project is moving forward and this challenge will not be present in 2013.

Fire Department currently showing a year-end **surplus of \$164,838**. Lower complement for part of the year and unforeseen one-time revenues are partially offset by higher overtime and vehicle costs.

General Government Activities currently showing a year-end **deficit of (\$152,027)** resulting in part from: slightly lower interest rates on cash and short-term investments, a reduction in the 2012 provincial educational tax rates (thereby reducing the portion of educational taxes retained by the City), slightly lower payments in lieu revenues, higher internal interest paid to reserves, overlapping of wages due to retirements, and slightly higher rebates provided to charities.

Local Agencies, Boards and Commissions expected to end the year on budget.

OPTIONS / ANALYSIS:

Option #1 – Report received and filed

Accept the report as presented. Given the conservative nature of estimates used, the on-going efforts of management to find further cost savings and efficiencies, along with the CAO's discretional spending freeze directive, the City is expected to end the year **on Budget**. No action by Council is required at this time.

RECOMMENDED OPTION / FINANCIAL OVERVIEW:

Given the current projection that the City's overall operations will end the year 2012 on budget, only one option is being recommended at this time.

The 2012 approved operating budget represented management's educated projections using trend analysis and business expertise. Despite best efforts, projected targets may not be met due to factors beyond the City's control. On-going budgetary challenges partly include:

- Increasing fuel costs
- Increasing utility costs
- Unexpected wage pressures (sick, compassionate leave, retirement costs, etc...)
- Fluctuating revenue volumes (tipping fees, POA fines, licensing, permits, etc...)

The Financial Services Department will continue to monitor accounts and work closely with the Business Unit Managers and Managing Directors to ensure spending remains under control.

Management will continue to review their cost centers' activities on an on-going basis and make necessary adjustments or reallocations of resources to ensure departments realize all possible savings and efficiencies.

In the event that the City is unable to achieve its current target, Reserve Funds can be used to offset any realized 2012 deficit. City Council established the '**Operating Expenditure Stabilization**' (#99552R) and '**Operating Revenue Stabilization**' (#99551R) Reserve Funds for future operating deficits. Through these two Reserve Funds, the City has at its disposal on the date of this report \$1,713,465 to offset any annual expenditure overages or revenue deficits, if authorized by City Council. At this time there is no immediate requirement for Council to authorize the use of Reserve Funds in 2012.

BACKGROUND:

Section 357 of the Municipal Act provides Council with the authority to cancel, reduce or refund taxes under various circumstances as set out in the Act upon application by the ratepayer.

The attached fourteen applications have been reviewed and verified by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC). Thirteen have been returned with a positive recommendation and one with a negative recommendation.

Applications 2012-14/15/16/17 deal with the same property but for 4 taxation years being, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012. The property owner stated that the dimensions of the condominium unit were less than what was used by MPAC to assess the unit therefore claimed that MPAC had made a gross or manifest error. MPAC confirmed that exterior measurements are used to assess condominiums and they used dimensions outlined in the registered documents therefore there is no gross or manifest error in the assessment of the property.

The subject applications deal specifically with:

- tax class change • Section 357 (1) (a)
- raised by fire/demolition • Section 357 (1) (d)(i)
- Section 357 (1)(d)(ii) - damaged and substantially unusable
- Section 357 (1)(f) - gross or manifest clerical/factual error

ANALYSIS/OPTIONS:

BEING A BY-LAW TO STOP UP, CLOSE AND CONVEY A PORTION OF THE LANEWAY LOCATED IN A BLOCK BOUNDED BY REGINA STREET, FRANKLIN STREET, LAURIER AVENUE AND ELLIS STREET IN THE CITY OF NORTH BAY

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and in the interest of The Corporation of the City of North Bay that part of the laneway abutting Lots 4 and 5, Plan 81 and Lots 46 and 47, Plan 81, be closed, stopped up and sold to the abutting owners;

AND WHEREAS by Resolution No. 2011-794 passed on the 12th day of December, 2011, Council approved the closure of the laneway;

AND WHEREAS the laneway abutting Lots 4 and 5, Plan 81 and Lots 46 and 47, Plan 81 is hereby declared to be surplus;

AND WHEREAS notice of this by-law was published once a week for two consecutive weeks in the North Bay Nugget, published in the City of North Bay;

AND WHEREAS no person has claimed that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the passing of this by-law nor applied to be heard in person or by his counsel, solicitor, or agent, the Council of the City nor a Committee of said Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That certain part of the laneway abutting Lots 4 and 5, Plan 81 and Lots 46 and 47, Plan 81 designated as Parts 1 and 2 on Reference Plan 36R-13354 is hereby closed, stopped up and conveyed.
- 2. The City shall transfer Parts 1 and 2, Plan 36R-13354 to the owners of the lands abutting thereon, their successors or assigns, upon receipt of the consent in writing of the abutting registered owner, if the transfer is to be to a person other than the abutting registered owner.
- 3.(a) Subject to paragraph (b), in the event that an abutting owner to the said laneway does not consent to the disposition of the laneway within 60 days of the date of the passing of this by-law, then the clerk shall, upon request of an abutting owner of the opposite side of the laneway, give 30 days notice by prepaid registered mail to the abutting owner of the laneway to the effect that if the abutting owner does not agree to purchase one-half of the abutting laneway at a pro-rata share of the survey, legal, advertising costs and purchase price incurred in the laneway closing, then the said one-half of the laneway may be transferred to the opposite owner for the same cost.
 - (b) Upon receipt of an Irrevocable Consent of the disposition of the laneway from the adjacent owner then that portion of the laneway may be transferred upon registration of the by-law.
- 4. This by-law comes into force and effect upon a certified copy of the by-law being registered in the Land Titles Office for the District of Nipissing.

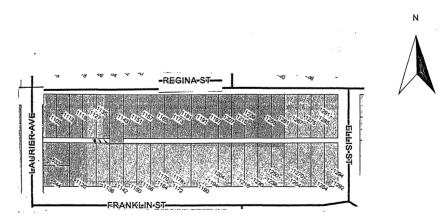

That where no individual by-law has been passed with respect to the taking of any action authorized in or by the Council mentioned in Section 1 hereof or with respect to the exercise of any powers of the Council, then this by-law shall be deemed for all purposes to the by-law required for approving and authorizing the taking of any action authorized therein or thereby required for the exercise of any powers therein by Council.
- 3. That the Mayor and the proper officers of The Corporation of the City of North Bay are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the said actions or to obtain approvals where required, and to execute all documents as may be necessary and directed to affix the corporate seal to all such documents as required.

AND WHEREAS Council passed Resolution No. 2012-638 at its Regular Meeting held Monday, November 6, 2012 to authorize smoking prohibitions for requested workplace and multi-residential apartment buildings.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That Schedules "A" and "D" to By-Law No. 2012-97 are hereby deleted and the attached Schedules "A" and "D" be inserted in lieu thereof.
- 2. This By-Law comes into effect upon passing.

BEING A BY-LAW FOR LICENSING, REGULATING AND GOVERNING BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF NORTH BAY

WHEREAS the *Municipal Act* R.S.O. 2001, Section 10 (2) authorizes a single tier municipality to pass by-laws respecting business licensing;

AND WHEREAS it is considered desirable to license, regulate and govern certain business in the City of North Bay so as to ensure the health and safety of the public;

AND WHEREAS it is considered desirable to license, regulate and govern certain business in the City of North Bay so as to mitigate any nuisance caused by the operation of any such business;

AND WHEREAS General Government Committee Report 2012-09 approved the licensing, regulating and governing of businesses within the City of North Bay was passed by Council on the 12th day of November, 2012.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. **DEFINITIONS**

For the purpose of this by-law:

- 1.1 **"Act"** refers to the *Municipal Act,* 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended, except where specific reference is made to another Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario or the Parliament of Canada.
- 1.2 **"Antique"** shall mean any good, object, material, merchandise or item of any kind which is of a higher value because of its age.
- 1.3 **"Antique/Collectible Show"** shall mean the offering for sale, on a temporary basis at one location, goods, wares or merchandise that have not been recently produced or manufactured.
- 1.4 **"Applicant"** shall mean a Person who is required to be licensed pursuant to this By-Law or who has made application for a licence to the Issuer of Licences and shall include a Licensee.
- 1.5 "Appropriate Authority having jurisdiction" shall mean:
 - (i) with regard to health matters, the Medical Officer of Health, or his or her designate for the North Bay Parry Sound District
 - Health Unit,
 - (ii) with regard to building matters, the Chief Building Official for the City, or his or her designate,
 - (iii) with regard to fire safety matters, the Chief Fire Official for the City, or his or designate,
 - (iv) with regard to police matters, the Chief of Police for the City or his or her designate.
- 1.6 **"Arts"** shall mean those kinds of articles which are the creation of the Applicant from raw materials such as oil paintings, water-colour paintings, wood and other sculptures.

- 1.7 **"Auction**" shall mean a public sale to Persons in which bids on goods, articles, merchandise, effects, etc., are received by an Auctioneer and where each bid offers more than the last previous bid, the article being put up for Auction sold to the highest bidder. This shall not include a Silent auction or Chance Auction, as defined as follows:
 - (i) "Silent Auction" shall mean an Auction conducted by means of written bids given on displayed goods, wares or merchandise with the final declaration of sale being made to the last individual having submitted a bid on the specified bid sheet for that item; and
 - (iii) "Chance Auction" (also known as a "Chinese Auction") shall mean an Auction conducted by means of predetermining a set price on an item, thence receiving verbal bids on such an item. The final declaration of sale shall be made to the highest bidder who shall then pay the price, based on the difference between the predetermined price and the highest bid.
- 1.8 . "Auctioneer" shall mean a Person who conducts a sale by Auction.
- 1.9 **"Business"** shall mean any business wholly or partly carried on within a municipality even if the business is being carried on from a location outside the municipality and includes:
 - (i) trades and occupations,
 - (ii) exhibitions, festivals and other organized public amusements held for profit or otherwise,
 - (iii) the sale or hire of goods or services on an intermittent or one-time basis and the activities of a hawker or peddler, and

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- (iv) the display of samples, patterns or specimens of goods for the purpose of sale or hire.
- 1.10 **"Business Day"** shall mean a day other than a Saturday or Sunday and any Statutory Holidays on which City Hall is closed for business.
- 1.11 **"Business Licence Fee"** shall mean a non-refundable monetary charge imposed by the City to issue a licence as set out in Schedule "A" hereto.
- 1.12 **"By-Law"** shall mean this By-Law and any amendments thereto passed by Council.
- 1.13 "Cash security deposit" shall mean cash or certified cheque.
- 1.14 "Chief Building Official" shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed by Council to the position of Chief Building Official in conformity with the provisions of the *Ontario Building Code* Act, R.S.O. 1992, c. 23, and amendments thereto.
- 1.15 **"Chief of Police"** shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed as Police Chief by North Bay Police Services Board.
- 1.16 "Circus/Midway" shall mean:
 - (i) a Business operating amusement ride(s) or other device(s);
 - (ii) a Business operating authorized games of chance, or
 - (iii) a performance exhibiting equestrian, animal, and acrobatic acts and their equipage intended to entertain or amuse or provide entertainment to the public.

- 1.17 "City" shall mean The Corporation of the City of North Bay.
- 1.18 **"City Clerk"** shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed by Council to act as the City Clerk.
- 1.19 **"City Engineer"** shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed by Council to act as the City Engineer.
- 1.20 **"Corporation"** shall mean The Corporation of the City of North Bay.
- 1.21 **"Council"** shall mean the Council of The Corporation of the City of North Bay.
- 1.22 "Craft" shall mean those kinds of articles which are the creation of the Applicant from raw materials wherein a limited amount of equipment is used and the article is utilitarian in nature such as woven material and carved objects.
- 1.23 **"Craft Show"** shall mean the temporary exhibition and offering for sale of Arts and Crafts.
- 1.24 **"Door-to-Door Sales/Service Person**" shall mean a person who goes from place to place selling or offering for sale a service of any kind.
- 1.25 **"Fire Chief"** shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed by Council to act as Fire Chief for the City and is ultimately responsible to Council as defined in the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act*, 1997, S.O. 1997, c. 4.
- 1.26 **"Fire Prevention Officer"** shall mean the person or his or her designate who is appointed as a Fire Prevention Officer under the provisions of the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act.*, 1997, S.O. 1997 c. 4.
- 1.27 **"Food"** shall mean food or drink for human consumption and includes refreshments and confections, but excludes liquor.
- 1.28 "Hawker and Peddler" shall mean any Person:
 - who goes from door to door with goods, wares or merchandise for sale or who carries and displays samples, patterns or specimens of any goods, wares or merchandise for which immediate sales are made and for which orders are taken with delivery to follow;
 - (ii) who sells from a permanent structure on a temporary basis, goods, wares or merchandise for sale, or who carries and displays samples, patterns or specimens of any goods, wares or merchandise for which immediate sales are made and for which orders are taken with delivery to follow; or
 - (iii) that is engaged in retail sales but does not have a commercial store front and includes their employees but does not include:
 - (a) Service Clubs,
 - (b) Not for Profit Clubs,
 - (c) Charitable Organizations or
 - (d) Such other institutions, organizations or clubs as the Council by Resolution may approve.

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1.29 **"Issuer of Licences"** shall mean the City Clerk or his or her designate.

- 1.30 **"Letter of Credit"** shall mean an irrevocable letter of credit that shall be drawn on a chartered Canadian Bank and deemed to be automatically extended without amendment for one (1) year from the present or any future expiration date thereof, unless thirty (30) days prior to any such date the bank shall notify the City in writing by registered mail that the bank elects not to consider this letter of credit renewed for any such additional period.
- 1.31 **"Licence"** shall mean a City of North Bay Business Licence issued pursuant to this By-Law.
- **1.32 "Licensee"** shall mean a Person who has been issued a Licence pursuant to this By-Law either in the current calendar year or in a previous calendar year and shall include an Applicant.
- 1.33 "Manager of Purchasing" shall mean the person or his or her designate who may, from time to time, be appointed by Council to act as the Manager of Purchasing.
- 1.34 "Masculine" shall include the feminine gender and the neuter.
- 1.35 **"Medical Officer of Health"** shall mean the Medical Officer of Health, or his or her designate, for the North Bay Parry Sound District Health.Unit
- 1.36 "Month" shall mean a calendar month.
- 1.37 **"Municipal Enforcement Officer"** shall mean a person or his or her designate who may, from time to time be appointed by the Council whose duties include the enforcement of this By-Law.
- 1.38 **"Non-Profit Charitable Organization"** shall mean an organization, whether incorporated or not, which:
 - (i) has objects and purposes that are exclusively or wholly charitable;
 - (ii) is recognized by Revenue Canada as being "charitable"; and
 - (iii) is in compliance with the reporting requirements under the *Charities Accounting Act* or is completing a Public Information Return under the *Income Tax Act*.
- 1.39 "Non-Profit Non-Charitable Organization" shall mean an organization whether incorporated or not, which has objects and purposes that are both charitable and non-charitable and that raises money for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education, the advancement of religion, culture and the arts, health and welfare or for athletic clubs and associations.
- 1.40 **"Non-Resident"** shall mean a person who has not resided continuously in the City for at least three (3) months immediately preceding the time of commencing a business in the City.
- 1.41 **"Operate"** shall mean to directly or indirectly manage, work, control, maintain, put or keep in a functional state any Business.
- 1.42 "Outdoor Patio" shall mean an encroachment on a sidewalk or boulevard outside of or immediately adjacent to a building or other structure providing services in the nature of a restaurant or tavern or like business and within or on which may be included objects such as tables, chairs, temporary entrance shelters, canopies, umbrellas, parasols and decorative planters.

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- 1.43 **"Owner"** shall mean the registered owner, tenant, beneficial owner, lessee or occupant of the lands and premises or the Person or his authorized agent in lawful control of the real property, premises, or building within the geographical boundaries of the City and who permits the operation or maintenance of any business.
- 1.44 "**Pawnbroker**" shall mean a person who carries on the business of taking by way of pawn or pledge any article for the repayment of money lent thereon, as defined in the *Pawnbrokers Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.6, as amended.
- 1.45 "*Pawnbrokers Act*" shall mean the *Pawnbrokers Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c.
 P.6 and the Regulations enacted thereunder as amended from time to time or any Act and Regulation enacted in substitution therefor.
- 1.46 **"Pawn Shop"** shall mean a business or premise where the business of a Pawnbroker is carried out.
- 1.47 "**Person**" shall include any individual, corporation, partnership, company, association, agent or trustee or party and the heirs, executors, administrators, or other legal representative of such person, to whom the context can apply according to law and shall include any group of persons comprising a society or other organization.
- 1.48 "**Pet Shop**" shall mean every shop, place, business or premise in which dogs, cats, fish, reptiles, birds or any other pet that is generally understood to be domesticated is sold or kept for sale.
- 1.49 "**Place of Amusement**" shall mean a building, premises, room or area which contains facilities, equipment or machines for the playing of:
 - (i) three or more games of chance, or
 - (ii) three or more games of mixed chance and skill, or
 - (iii) a combination of three or more games of chance and games of mixed chance and skill.

Games shall include, but shall not be limited to, video games, pinball games, table top hockey games, table top soccer games, electronic games, and billiard tables, pool tables or bagatelle tables or bowling alleys and any other games that are not contrary to the Criminal Code of Canada R.S.C., 1985, c. C-46.

- 1.50 **"Place of Business"** shall mean any place, Premises or Location, or part thereof, in or from which a Business is carried on, and includes a shop, office or a vehicle for the purpose of carrying on the Business.
- 1.51 **"Premises"** shall mean land, including any and all buildings or other structures thereon and includes any vehicle or conveyance used in the operation of a Business.
- 1.52 **"Precious Metals"** shall mean a valuable metal, which includes but is not limited to gold, silver and platinum.
- 1.53 **"Property Taxes"** shall mean the amount of taxes levied on real property under the *Ontario Municipal Act*, 2001 S.O. 2001, c.25, and the *Education Act* and any amounts owed under the *Drainage Act*, the *Tile Drainage Act* and the *Shoreline Property Assistance Act* with respect to real property and includes any amounts deemed to be taxes by or under any other Act and any amounts given priority lien status by or under any Act.

- 1.54 "*Provincial Offences Act"* shall mean the *Provincial Offences Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.33 and the Regulations enacted thereunder as amended from time to time or any Act and Regulation enacted in substitution therefor.
- 1.55 **"Purchase"** shall mean to obtain Precious Metals by paying money or its equivalent and shall include the terms purchase, exchange and acquire by any means and "purchasing" and "purchased" has a like meaning.
- 1.56 **"Purchase Event"** shall mean an event held for primary purpose of purchasing Precious Metals from members of the public at large or from a Person or Persons invited to the purchase event.
- 1.57 **"Refreshment Vehicle"** shall mean any Vehicle from which Food and/or refreshments are sold or offered for sale for consumption by the public and includes without limiting the generality of the foregoing, carts, wagons, trailers and trucks.
- 1.58 **"Resident"** shall mean a Person who has resided continuously in the City for a period of three (3) or more months immediately preceding the time of commencing a Business in the City.
- 1.59 "**Restaurant**" shall mean any Premises in which Food is prepared and provided for sale for immediate consumption within the building or premises and includes but is not limited to, an accessory take-out service, an ice cream establishment, dairy bar, tea room, sandwich shop, lunch counter and fish and chip shop but does not include any class of refreshment vehicle.

1.60 "Seasonal Restaurant" shall mean:

- (i) a building, structure or part thereof where Food is prepared on or off the premises and is offered for sale to the public; and
- (ii) that is not operated for more than eight (8) months in any calendar year.
- **1.61** "Sidewalk" shall mean that portion of a street between the curb lines or the lateral lines of a roadway and the adjacent property lines intended for the use of pedestrians.
- 1.62 "Sign" shall mean any device, structure, fixture or placard using graphics, symbols, and/or written copy for the primary purpose of identifying, providing directions or advertising any establishment, product, goods or services, with the exception of window displays, interior signs, national flags and painting of exterior building walls. For the purpose of removal of signs, this definition may also include all sign structures as well as any inflatable advertising devices.
- 1.63 "Singular" includes the plural and the plural includes the singular.
- 1.64 "Special Event Organizer" shall mean the Person who organizes any type of Craft Show, Trade Show or Antique/Collectible Show (collectively referred to as the "Show"), whether for profit or not.
- 1.65 **"Tattoo and/or Body Piercing Parlour"** shall mean a Business or Premise where the skin of an individual is marked by puncturing it and inserting a pigment or pigments to make permanent marks or designs and/or where parts of a body are punctured by a sharppointed instrument for the purpose of making a hole or opening through which an item may be attached to the body but shall not include a Premises which is operated solely for the purpose of piercing earlobes.

- 1.66 **"Tobacco"** shall mean a product composed in whole or in part of tobacco, including tobacco leaves, and any extract of tobacco leaves. It includes cigarette papers, tubes, filters and snuff but does not include any food, drug or device that contains nicotine to which the *Food and Drugs Act*, R.S.C., 1985, c. F-27 applies.
- 1.67 **"Trade Show"** shall mean a Business or a Person which coordinates a show or similar exhibition of three (3) or more vendors or businesses exhibiting, offering for sale, selling or otherwise displaying for delivery at a later date, goods, wares, merchandise, items, or services of a similar nature and where the vendors or Businesses will be organized at a specific location for a period not to exceed fourteen (14) consecutive days.
- 1.68 **"Vehicle"** shall include an automobile, motorcycle, motor vehicle, trailer, mobile home, traction engine, farm tractor, road-building machine, bicycle and any vehicle drawn, propelled or driven by any kind of power, including muscular power and shall include a motorized snow vehicle or all terrain vehicle.
- **1.69 "Zoning Administrator**" shall mean a person who may be appointed from time to time by Council to the position of Zoning Administrator for the City.

2. <u>GENERAL PROVISIONS - BUSINESS LICENSING</u>

- 2.1 Every Person carrying on, conducting, operating, maintaining, keeping or engaging in any Business specifically identified in Schedule "A" hereto shall be required to obtain a Licence from the Issuer of Licences.
- 2.2 The Owner of a premise shall not permit a person to operate a Business on the premises without a Licence, where such Licence is required by this By-Law.
- 2.3 For the purposes of this By-Law a Business shall not include:
 - 2.3.1 a manufacturing activity or an industry, except to the extent that it sells its products or raw materials by retail,
 - 2.3.2 the selling of goods by wholesale, or
 - 2.3.3 the generation, exploitation, extraction, harvesting, processing, renewal or transportation of natural resources.

3. APPLICATION FOR NEW LICENCE

- 3.1 Every Person required to obtain a Licence pursuant to this By-Law:
 - 3.1.1 shall apply in writing on the appropriate application form as provided by the Issuer of Licences;
 - 3.1.2 shall deposit, at the time of application, with the Issuer of Licences, all required non-refundable Business Licence Fees as set out in Schedule "A" to this By-Law for each Business category; and
 - 3.1.3 provide any required approvals, inspections or documentation required by the provisions of this By-Law or as deemed necessary by the Issuer of Licences.

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3.2 The Applicant shall be responsible for obtaining all necessary inspections, documents and approvals as set out on the application form and as deemed necessary by the Issuer of Licences.

- 3.3 The Issuer of Licences shall not issue a Licence until:
 - 3.3.1 all required approvals and inspections as required by the application have been obtained by the Applicant,
 - 3.3.2 Business Licence Fees have been paid in full,
 - 3.3.3 all Property Taxes are paid to the satisfaction of the City when required as a condition of obtaining a licence,
 - 3.3.4 any outstanding fines imposed under the *Provincial Offences Act* for the contravention of a provision of any City of North Bay By-Law arising out of the operation of a Business, whether such fines are owed by the Applicant personally or by any Business of which the Applicant is an Owner, as defined by this By-Law, and
 - 3.3.5 all of the required documentation has been provided to the Issuer of Licences.
- 3.4 There shall be a separate Licence for each of the premises to be used by the Applicant.
- 3.5 There shall be a separate application for each category of Business operated and Licence to be issued.
- 3.6 The Applicant shall comply with all requirements as set out in this By-Law as well as all applicable Federal, Provincial, Municipal Statutes, Regulations, By-Laws and Codes and any other provisions that may govern the Business, Place or Premises used in the carrying on of the Business and/or the Persons carrying on the Business or engaged in it and to which the application pertains.
- 3.7 The Issuer of Licences, upon receipt of the application for a Licence may make, cause to be made, or request, any additional documents, investigations, approvals or inspections to be made in respect of such application for a Licence as the Issuer of Licences deems appropriate or in the interest of the general public, and any costs incurred for such inspection or documents shall be at the Applicant's expense.
- 3.8 Upon receipt of a completed application, together with all required documentation for a Licence and the appropriate Business Licence Fees have been paid, the Issuer of Licences may prior to the issuance of any such Licence:
 - 3.8.1 make any inquiries to any municipal official or employee, who has carried out inspections relative to the business under application,
 - 3.8.2 receive reports from such municipal officials and employees as may be deemed necessary, and
 - 3.8.3 inquire into all relevant matters in order to ascertain if the Applicant is entitled to a Licence under the provisions of this By-Law.
- 3.9 Upon being satisfied that the Applicant is entitled to obtain a Licence under the provisions of this By-Law, the Issuer of Licences shall prepare and issue a Licence to the Applicant.

4. APPLICATION FOR RENEWAL LICENCE

4.1 Every Person required to renew a Licence previously granted under this By-Law, shall submit to the Issuer of Licences, an application form for renewal of the Licence as provided by the Issuer of Licences.

- 4.2 Every Applicant shall ensure that the information on the application is up to date.
- 4.3 Where there has been a change of circumstance the Issuer of Licences shall not issue a Licence until:
 - 4.3.1 all required approvals and inspections have been obtained by the Applicant,
 - 4.3.2 the required documentation has been provided,
 - 4.3.3 all Business Licence Fees have been paid in full,
 - 4.3.4 all Property Taxes are paid to the satisfaction of the City when required as a condition of obtaining a licence, and
 - 4.3.5 any outstanding fines imposed under the *Provincial Offences Act* for the contravention of a provision of any City of North Bay By-Law arising out of the operation of a Business, whether such fines are owed by the Applicant personally or by any Business of which the Applicant is an Owner, as defined by this By-Law.
- 4.4 Where the Issuer of Licences receives an application for renewal of a Licence previously granted under this By-Law and the appropriate fees have been paid, he or she shall, prior to the issuance of any such Licence:
 - 4.4.1 make inquiries into all relevant matters in order to ascertain. if the Applicant is entitled to obtain a renewed Licence under the provisions of this By-Law,
 - 4.4.2 inquire into any and all relevant changes in circumstances since the previous Licence was issued to the Applicant ,
 - 4.4.3 make any inquiries to any municipal official or employee, who has carried out inspections or investigations relative to the Business under application, and
 - 4.4.4 receive reports from such municipal officials and employees as may be deemed necessary.
- 4.5 When the Issuer of Licences is satisfied that the Applicant is entitled to obtain a Licence under the provisions of this By-Law, the Issuer of Licences shall prepare and issue a Licence to the said Applicant.

5. FORM OF LICENCE

- 5.1 Every Licence shall show therein:
 - 5.1.1 the operating name of the Business or Person to whom the Licence is issued,
 - 5.1.2 the operating address of the Premises or location for which the Licence is issued,
 - 5.1.3 the category of Licence granted,
 - 5.1.4 the date of issue of the licence,
 - 5.1.5 the date of expiration of the licence, and
 - 5.1.6 shall be signed by the Issuer of Licences.

6. ADMINISTRATION FEES

6.1 An administration fee of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) will apply to the following:

Duplicate Licence:

6.1.1 In the event that the Licence issued under this By-Law is lost or destroyed, the Issuer of Licences upon satisfactory proof of such loss or destruction, and upon payment of the administration fee, shall issue a duplicate of the original Licence, upon which shall be stamped or marked the word "DUPLICATE" or "COPY". The expiry date of the "Duplicate" or "Copy" shall be the same as the one being replaced.

Late Renewals:

6.1.2 In the event that a Licence is not renewed on or before the existing expiry date, notwithstanding any charge(s) that may be laid under this By-Law, the Applicant shall also be required to pay a \$25.00 Administration Fee in addition to the applicable Business Licence Fee.

7. CHANGE OF NAME

7.1 Where the ownership of a Business is not changed or affected but the operating name has changed, the Licensee shall within thirty (30) Business Days of such change notify the Issuer of Licences and upon being satisfied that there has been no other change in the circumstances of the Licenced Business, the Issuer of Licences may issue a replacement of the original Licence. The Licensee shall return and surrender their Licence in order to affect such a change at no cost. The expiry date of the Licence shall be the same as the one being replaced.

8. CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP

8.1 Every Licensee shall, upon change of ownership of the Licenced Business return and surrender their current Licence to the Issuer of Licences. The new owner shall make application for a new Licence as set out in this By-Law.

9. CHANGE OF PREMISES

9.1 Where a currently Licenced Business changes Premises, such new Premises shall not be deemed to be Licenced. The Licensee shall notify the Issuer of Licences within seven (7) Business Days of the change of location and surrender to the Issuer of Licences the Licence issued with respect to their previous Premises. The Issuer of Licences shall upon payment of a fee in the amount of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) and being satisfied that the new location meets all the requirements as set out in this By-Law issue a replacement to the original Licence. The expiry date of the Licence shall be the same as the one being replaced.

10. LICENCE PERSONAL

- 10.1 No Person shall enjoy a vested or property right in any Licence or the continuance of any Licence or such a Licence and such rights shall remain the property of the City.
- 10.2 Licences are not transferable.

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11. NUISANCE ABATEMENT

- 11.1 Every Person required to be Licensed under this By-Law, in addition to any other provisions or requirements expressed elsewhere in the By-Law, shall comply with the following requirements:
 - 11.1.1 at all times maintain and keep safe and clean and in good condition and repair any Place of Business for which the Licence is issued including any Vehicle used for or by the Licensed Business,
 - 11.1.2 shall not breach or violate or cause, suffer, or permit any breach or violation of any By-Law of the City or of any statute, Order-In-Council, or Regulation of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario or the Parliament of Canada or of any Agency, Board or Commission thereof, in, upon, or in connection with the Business or Premises for, or in relation to which such Licence was issued,
 - 11.1.3 shall not cause, suffer or commit any nuisance to arise in, on, or in connection with the Place of Business, Vehicle or Premises, for which the Licence was issued,
 - 11.1.4 shall not cause, suffer or permit any shouting, noise or other disturbance on, in or in connection with the Place of Business, Vehicle or Premises for which the Licence was issued, that is unnecessary, unreasonable or contrary to any municipal By-Law prohibiting the same, and if any such shouting, noise or other disturbance occurs, the Licensee shall immediately take steps to cause the same to be abated,
 - 11.1.5 shall not cause, suffer, or permit any obstruction on any highway, lane or public place in front of or adjoining the place or premises for which the Licence was issued, and
 - 11.1.6 shall not cause, suffer or permit any profane, offensive or abusive language or disorderly conduct in, on, or in connection with any Vehicle or Premises for which the Licence was issued.
- 11.2 Every Person who acquires a Licence that is issued under this By-Law is responsible for the due performance and observance of all the provisions of this By-Law by their employees, agents, invitees and all other persons in or upon the Premises that is Licensed under the provisions of this By-Law.

12. INSPECTION

- 12.1 A Municipal Enforcement Officer, Issuer of Licences, Police Officer or other duly appointed individual may at all reasonable times, inspect or cause to be inspected the Premises, facilities, equipment, Vehicles, and other property used or kept for hire in connection with the carrying on of a Business that is Licensed or that is required to be Licensed pursuant to this By-Law.
- 12.2 No person shall hinder or obstruct, or attempt to hinder or obstruct, a Municipal Enforcement Officer, Issuer of Licences, Police Officer or other duly appointed individual who is exercising a power or performing a duty under this By-Law, including carrying out an inspection.
 - 12.3 The owner of a premises shall, upon request by a Municipal Enforcement Officer, Issuer of Licences, Police Officer or other duly appointed individual, provide forthwith information relating to any person conducting Business on the premises who is required to obtain

a Licence pursuant to this By-Law, including the corporate name, business name, address, phone number, and dates of operation at that premises.

12.4 No person shall knowingly provide false information in any application under this By-Law or in any document, correspondence or other form of communication required to be furnished under this By-Law.

13. POSTING OF LICENCE

- 13.1 Every Person licensed pursuant to this By-Law shall post in a prominent and conspicuous place the current Licence on the premises or that part thereof to which the Licence pertains. The Licensee shall ensure that the Licence is positioned in such location that it may be readily seen and read by persons entering the Premises.
- 13.2 Where a Licence is issued to a Person who goes from place to place or to a particular place with food, goods, wares, or merchandise for sale, the Licensee shall keep the Licence with them at all times while carrying out their Business and shall exhibit it to any Municipal Enforcement Officer, Issuer of Licences, Police Officer or other authority having jurisdiction who so requests.

14. REFUSAL TO GRANT A LICENCE

- 14.1 The Issuer of Licences may refuse to grant or issue a licence to any Applicant who:
 - 14.1.1 has failed to comply with the requirements of this By-Law or other applicable By-Laws of the City or of any Statute,
 Order-in-Council, or Regulation of the Provincial Legislature or the Parliament of Canada, or of any Agency, Board of Commission thereof, in, upon or in connection with the applied for licensed activity of the Business or Premises, facilities, equipment, Vehicles or other property used or kept for hire in connection with the Licensed activity,
 - 14.1.2 has any outstanding Property Taxes owing to the City, or
 - 14.1.3 has any outstanding fines imposed under the *Provincial Offences Act* for the contravention of any provision of this By-Law.
- 14.2 The Issuer of Licences may also, at their discretion, refuse to grant or issue a Licence to any Applicant where the Issuer of Licences believes it is not in the public interest to do so.

15. SUSPENSION/REVOCATION

- 15.1 The Issuer of Licences may suspend or revoke a Licence issued to any Licensee who:
 - 15.1.1 has failed to comply with the requirements of this By-Law or other applicable By-Laws of the City or of any Local Board thereof, or of any Statute, Order-in-Council, or Regulation of the Provincial Legislature or the Parliament of Canada, or of any Agency or Board of Commission thereof, in, upon or in connection with the applied for Licensed activity of the Business or Premise, facilities, equipment, Vehicles and other property used or kept for hire in connection with the Licensed activity,
 - 15.1.2 has outstanding Property Taxes owing to the City, or

- 15.1.3 has any outstanding fines imposed under the *Provincial* Offences Act for the contravention of any provision of this By-Law.
- 15.2 The Issuer of Licences may also suspend or revoke any Licence issuedto any Applicant where the Issuer of Licences believes it is in the public interest to do so.
- 15.3 Any suspension of a Licence may be subject to such terms and conditions as the Issuer of Licences may prescribe.
- 15.4 No person shall operate any Business or Premise contrary to any Licence suspension or terms and conditions thereto or where such Licence has been revoked.

16. NOTICE AND APPEAL

- 16.1 Where the Issuer of Licences refuses to issue, suspends, or revokes a Licence the said Issuer of Licences shall notify the Applicant in writing of such decision and the said notice shall set out the grounds upon which the issue of the said Licence is refused, suspended or revoked and shall state that the Applicant or Licensee may appeal such decision by filing an appeal with the Clerk of the municipality within fifteen (15) days of receiving the notice.
- 16.2 Upon receipt of an appeal from the Applicant, the Clerk and Council shall follow the procedure set out in this By-Law.
- 16.3 A Hearing Committee may hear any interested parties or afford them an opportunity to be heard on any matter where Council is required by law to hold a hearing in relation to any act, by-law or decision.
- 16.4 The Hearing Committee shall be comprised of the Mayor, the Chair and the Vice-Chair of the Standing Committee to which the matter relates, or their nominees from the Standing Committee. Any other Councillor may sit to hear the interested parties, but shall not be a Member of the Hearing Committee for the purpose of making a recommendation to the Council.
- 16.5 The Hearing Committee shall be bound by the *Statutory Powers Procedure Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. 22, as amended.
- 16.6 Except as otherwise herein provided this By-Law applies mutatis mutandis to the Hearing Committee.
- 16.7 Upon the conclusion of a hearing conducted by the Hearing Committee, the Hearing Committee shall, as soon as practicable, make a written report to Council summarizing the evidence and arguments presented by the parties, the findings of fact made by the Hearing Committee and the recommendations, if any, of the Hearing Committee with reasons therefor on the merits on the application in respect of which the hearing has been conducted.
- 16.8 After considering the report of the Hearing Committee, Council may thereupon in respect of such application, do any act, pass any by-law or make any decision that it might have done, passed or made, had it conducted the hearing itself.

17. CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

17.1 Any non-profit charitable organization selling items for the purpose of raising funds for such charitable organization shall be required to obtain a Licence and no Business Licence Fee shall be payable for such Licence under the provisions of this By-Law. All monies being raised at the event must be wholly for the benefit of the charitable organization.

18. **INSURANCE**

18.1 All insurances required herein shall be provided at the time of application in a form acceptable to the Issuer of Licences and in the amount as specified pursuant to the applicable Sections of this By-Law.

19. LICENCE FEES AND INSPECTIONS

- 19.1 The Business Licence Fees to be paid for a Licence and the renewal for a Licence shall be as set out in the attached Schedule "A".
- 19.2 Incomplete applications shall be considered not to have been received and may be returned to the Applicant or held pending further information. In any case where the application remains incomplete after the date established for obtaining or renewing such Licence, the Applicant may be required to submit a new application in accordance with provisions of Section 3 hereof.

20. EXPIRY OF LICENCE

20.1 For the purpose of every new Licence issued, the date of expiry shall be the date as set out on the Licence.

21. PENALTY

21.1 A person who contravenes a provision of this By-Law is guilty of an offence and on conviction is liable to a fine of not less than \$500.00 and not more than \$50,000.00.

22. LICENCE RECORDS

22.1 The Issuer of Licences shall maintain records of Applications and related documentation, inspection reports, departmental and agency approvals and Licences issued, in accordance with the City's Retention By-Law.

23. SEVERABILITY

Should any section of this By-Law be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be ultra vires or illegal for any reason, the remaining parts shall nevertheless remain valid and binding, and shall be read as if the offending section or part had been struck out.

24. ADVERTISING

Any Sign advertising any event or business shall be in accordance with City of North Bay By-Law No. 2006-143, and any amendment thereto, being a By-Law to Restrict and Regulate Signs and Other Advertising Devices, Including Posting of Notices on Public Property within the City of North Bay.

25. **REPEAL**

25.1 By-Law 2004-191 and any amendments thereto are hereby repealed.

26. **ENACTMENT**

26.1 This By-Law shall take effect on January 1, 2013.

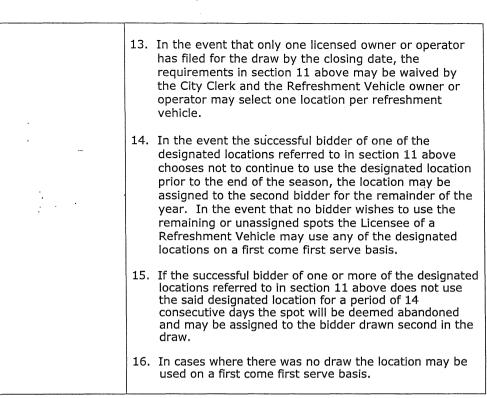

- h) ensure that all dispensing equipment is of a sanitary design and cleaned on a daily basis,
- ensure that adequate refrigeration, as approved by the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit, is provided for perishable Food that shall be kept so refrigerated,
- j) ensure that the date of expiration is clearly and legibly marked on or affixed to the wrapper of all sandwiches or pre-packaged food sold from the Refreshment Vehicle,
- k) ensure that beverages, which shall include but shall not be limited to, milk, juices, and soft drinks, are only sold in individual disposable containers,
- ensure that Refreshment Vehicles from which hot, prepared foods are sold are so equipped as to maintain such foods so heated at a temperature as approved by the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit,
- m) ensure that no LPG (liquefied petroleum gas) LNG (liquefied natural gas) or any combustible fuelled appliance is operated within ten (10) feet of any structure, door, window, or opening that shall include an alcove or alleyway,
- n) ensure that the Refreshment Vehicle is free from holes, crevices or cracks and all surfaces are readily washable and are kept clean and in good condition,
- o) ensure that only single service disposable cups, lates, forks, spoons, knives and containers are used and serviettes shall be provided from a dispenser, and
- p) ensure that all condiments are in sealed single serve packages or a sealed container.
- Every person selling or handling refreshments and Food shall be clean and neat in appearance and shall maintain clean hands at all times. If no sink is available for hand washing then every person selling or handling refreshments and Food shall be supplied with gloves or hand sanitizer.
- 3. No Licensee or person employed with any Licensee under this section shall be suffering from any form of contagious disease while actively engaged in his or her work.
- 4. Gloves must be worn by any Licensee or Employee handling Food or refreshments who has an open cut or wound on their hands.
- 5. Every Licensee shall take out a separate Licence for each Refreshment Vehicle owned or operated by them and the Licence shall be affixed so as to be clearly visible.



 Every Licensee shall at his or her own expense, whenever required to do so by the Issuer of Licences, bring such Refreshment Vehicle to any person designated by the Issuer of Licences for inspection.

- 7. All Refreshment Vehicle owners shall carry a minimum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) liability insurance and shall furnish proof of this coverage satisfactory to the City prior to being licensed. Such insurance shall contain an endorsement specifying that the municipality shall be given a minimum thirty (30) days written notice of any change, expiration, or cancellation of such policy. Where the Refreshment Vehicle has been granted permission to operate on City property, the policy shall also contain an endorsement identifying "The Corporation of the City of North Bay" as an additional insured.
- 8. Every Licensee shall ensure that each operator or employee is made familiar with the contents of this Section and shall not permit any operator under their control, management, supervision or direction to breach any of the provisions of this Section and any Regulations from the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit or any other Authority having Jurisdiction.
- 9. No Licensee or employee of a Refreshment Vehicle shall dispense Food to any person while such person is standing on a roadway.
- 10. No Licensee or Employee of a Refreshment Vehicle shall operate within thirty (30) metres of an existing restaurant with the exception of the Refreshment 'Vehicles operating within the provisions of Section 11.
- 11. No Licensee or Employee of a Refreshment Vehicle shall when operating on public property operate from any other location in the central business district as defined on Schedule "L-1" attached to this by-law other than in the areas designated as follows:
 - 11.1 100 Block, Main Street West, in the marked location in the vicinity of the C.I.B.C. identified as "L1" as shown on the attached Schedule "L-1"
 - 11.2 100 Block, Main Street West, in the marked location in the vicinity of the Royal Bank identified as "L2" as shown on the attached Schedule "L-1"

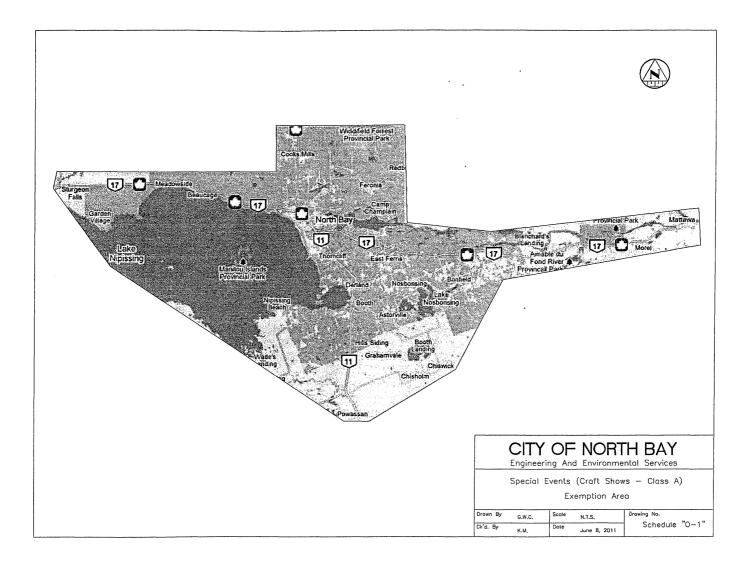

- 3. That City of North Bay By-Law No. 2012-211 is hereby repealed.

(PERUT CONSTRUCTION LTD. – 345 MCPHAIL STREET)

WHEREAS the owner of the subject property has initiated an amendment to the Zoning By-law;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of North Bay has ensured that adequate information has been made available to the public, and has held at least one public meeting after due notice for the purpose of informing the public of this By-law;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed desirable to amend Section 11 of By-law No. 28-80 pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act R.S.O. 1990, as amended.

AND WHEREAS Council passed a resolution on April 14th, 2008 to approve this rezoning.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- Schedule "B-43" of By-law No. 28-80 is amended by changing the zoning designation of the property shown on Schedules "A" and "B" attached hereto (which property is more particularly described as Plan M28, Lot 450 and Part of Lot 451, PIN 49156-0927) on McPhail Street in the City of North Bay from a "Residential Third Density (R3)" zone to a "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No.113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone.
- All buildings or structures erected or altered and the use of land in such "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No.113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone shall conform to all applicable provisions of By-law No. 28-80 of the Corporation of the City of North Bay.
- 3) Section 11 of By-law No. 28-80 is amended by inserting at the end thereof the following 11.2.113.1:

11.2.113 Residential Multiple Second Density Special No. 113 (RM2 Sp.113)

- 11.2.113.1 The property description of this "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No.
 113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone is: Plan M28, Lot 450 and Part of Lot 451, PIN 491560927 along McPhail Street in the City of North Bay as shown on the attached Schedules and Schedule "B-43"
- 11.2.113.2 The regulations for this "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No. 113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone are as follows:

i) The minimum lot area per dwelling shall be 188.71 square metres;

ii) The minimum lot frontage shall be 19.81 metres;

- 11.2.113.3 The use of land or buildings in this "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No.
 113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone shall conform to all other regulations of this By-law, except as hereby expressly varied.
- Section 11 of By-law No. 28-80 is further amended by inserting "Residential Multiple Second Density Special No. 113 (RM2 Sp.113)" zone as Schedule "C" to this By-law.
- 5) Pursuant to Section 41 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990 as amended, those lands shown as hatched on Schedule "A" attached hereto are hereby designated as a Site Plan Control Area.
- a) Notice of this By-law shall be given by the Clerk in the manner and form and to the persons prescribed by Section 4 of O. Reg. 254/06 as amended.
 - b) Where no notice of appeal is filed with the Clerk of The Corporation of the City of North
 Bay within twenty (20) days after the day that the giving of written notice as required by the
 Act is completed, then this By-law shall be deemed to have come into
 force on the day it was passed.
 - c) Where one or more notices of appeal are filed with the Clerk of The Corporation of the City of North Bay within twenty (20) days after the day that the giving of written notice as required by the Act is completed, setting out the objection to the By-law and the reasons in support of the objection, then this By-law shall not come into force until all appeals have been finally disposed of, whereupon the By-law shall be deemed to have come into force on the day it was passed.
