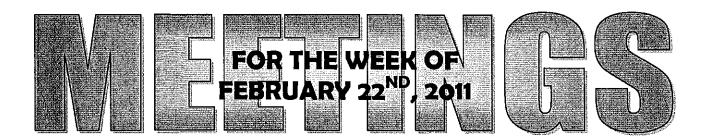

 - c) the Sanitary Sewer Surcharge remains at 106% of water charges;
 - the Water Filtration Capital Surcharge authorized in clause 3.e) of By-Law No. 2009-235 remain at 10% of the gross water component of water accounts effective January 1, 2011; and
 - e) the net increase effective March 1st on a typical flat rate residential account be 6% or \$3.87 per month.

MINUTES OF THE PUBLIC MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL HELD UNDER THE PLANNING ACT HELD MONDAY, FEBRUARY 14TH, 2011

Notice of this proposed closure was circulated to all parties that may have an interest in this matter with the following comments received:

- 2) Engineering Department no objection.
- 3) Director, Parks, Recreation and Leisure Services no objection.
- 4) Chief Fire Prevention Officer no objection.
- 5) North Bay-Mattawa Conservation Authority no objection.
- 6) Bell Canada no comment.
- 7) Ministry of Transportation no comment.
- 8) Union Gas no comment.
- 9) Planning Services "The subject property is designated 'Residential' under the Official Plan and zoned 'Residential Third Density (R3)' and 'Residential Second Density (R2)' in the City of

North Bay's Zoning By-law No. 28-80. Planning Services staff conducted a site visit in January of 2011 and have no objection to the proposed laneway closure."

No further correspondence was received from any circulated internal department or external agency regarding this matter.

The notice regarding the proposed closure was circulated to all of the property owners that abut the portion of laneway proposed to be closed. None of the property owners contacted Planning Services with respect to the proposed closure. Based on the site inspection completed by Planning staff on January 28th, 2011 it appears as though the laneway is not currently occupied by any abutting owner. The neighbour at the rear has a fence which appears to go along their rear lot line and does not occupy the laneway, but this will only be confirmed after the required survey is completed in the spring. The applicant has requested the laneway closure to provide additional access to the rear yard.

Option 1 - Do not close the laneway. This option is not recommended because there is no municipal requirement for the subject laneway.

Option 2 - Close the laneway and transfer a portion to each abutting owner. This option is not recommended. Each property owner was circulated regarding the proposed closure and none have expressed an interest in acquiring a portion of the laneway.

Option 3 - Close the laneway and transfer the whole laneway to the applicant. This option is the recommended option. No other property owner is interested in a portion of the laneway and there is no municipal requirement for the laneway.

RECOMMENDED OPTION / FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Option 3 is the recommended option.

The subject application to close the laneway and transfer ownership of the subject lands, with the necessary easements being registered, is appropriate.

All costs associated with the proposed closure including, but not limited to, the application fee, advertising, survey and legal work, shall be borne by the Applicant. The requisite advertising survey and legal work shall occur to the satisfaction of the City.

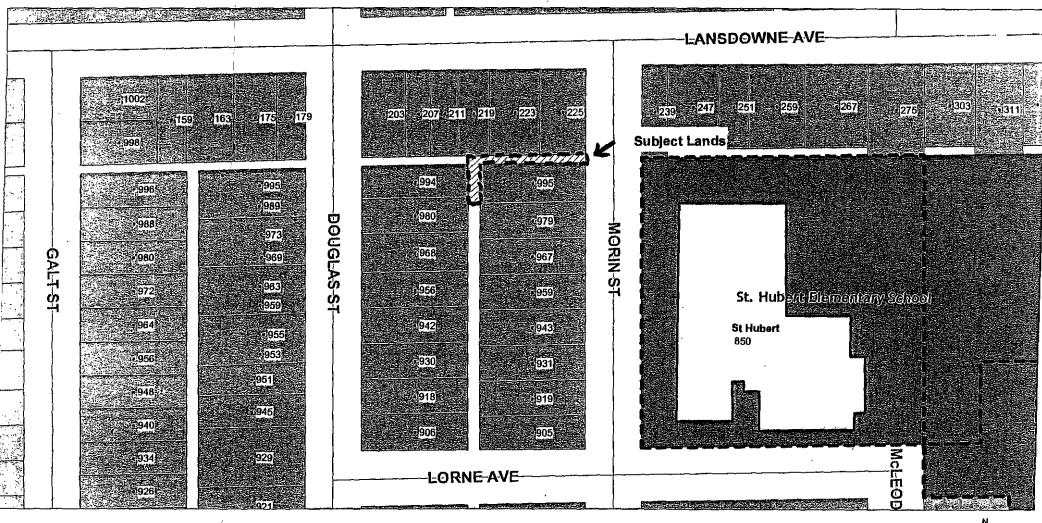

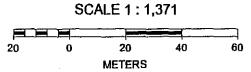

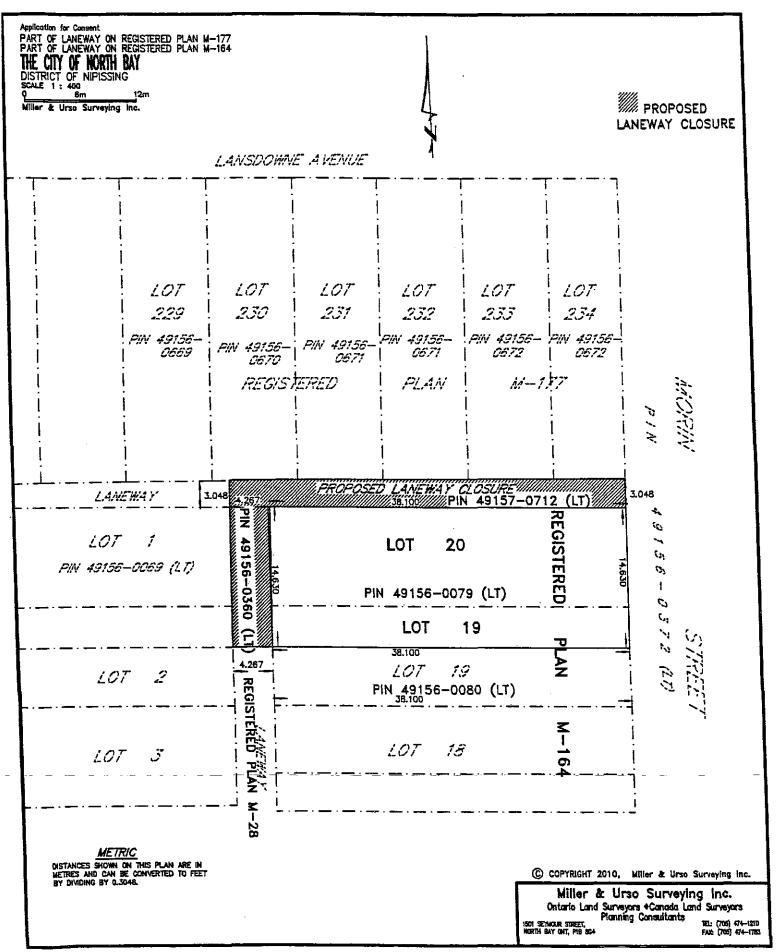

BACKGROUND

The 2011 Capital Budget included an amount of \$350,000 for the Park Vehicle and Equipment Replacement Program being 2011 Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 95, Project No. 6028PR which would provide for the purchase of replacement vehicles and equipment.

The tendering of vehicles and equipment will be initiated upon Council's approval of the bylaw. Each vehicle or piece of equipment will only be recommended for purchase if there is sufficient budget allocation available.

The following vehicle and equipment replacements are scheduled in 2011; one crew cab, one service truck, one ice resurfacer, Sports Complex equipment, one turf/leaf vacuum, and small equipment.

Vehicle and Equipment Purchase Cost \$332,500

Finance Costs \$ 17,500

NET DEBENTURE COST \$ 350,000

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS

Option 1 – That a Capital Expenditure By-law be prepared for the consideration of City Council to authorize the Parks Vehicle and Equipment Replacement Program being 2011 Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 95, Project No. 6028PR at a net debenture cost of \$350,000.

The Parks and Facilities fleet of vehicles and equipment require an annual replacement program. The approval of the by-law will allow staff to begin the purchasing process. The

actual cost of each vehicle or piece of equipment will be compared to the budget estimates, and adjustments will be made on an ongoing basis to ensure the total costs are within the program's approved limit.

Option 2 - Either cancel the Equipment Replacement Program or reduce the expenditure limit for this year.

This option would defer vehicle and equipment replacement to future years. It would have a serious impact on the Parks operations as it is essential that the existing equipment is functional and ready for duty. There is no backup equipment and a prolonged breakdown will have serious implications to the delivery of service of the Parks and Facilities operation. This would impair the quality of recreation facilities and the enjoyment of users.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Chief Financial Officer be authorized to transfer \$20,000 from the Corporate Wellness Reserve Fund to Fire and Emergency Services for one-time costs associated with fitness equipment replacement and related wellness training initiatives.

BACKGROUND

Wellness is a holistic term used to describe both the physical and mental wellbeing of an individual or group of individuals.

The City of North Bay strives to ensure a healthy work environment for all its employees and offer various programs and events to achieve this goal.

Recently, representatives of City Administration, Fire Management and the North Bay Professional Fire Fighters have met to discuss a joint approach to maintaining and / or enhancing overall wellness / fitness within the Fire and Emergency Services Department.

A high level of physical fitness and mental awareness is essential within this area of the City operation. There is a direct correlation between improved wellness and improved attendance.

The funding, if approved by Council, would be directed to replacing end of life fitness equipment or purchasing new, appropriate equipment to be deployed at the three staffed Fire Stations. The estimated cost of this equipment is approximately \$14,000. The remaining \$6,000 would be used throughout the year for various related training initiatives.

OPTONS / ANALYSIS

Option 1

Not approve the requested funding. Existing fitness equipment has been in place for a number of years and is in need of replacement or improvement. This option is not recommended.

Option 2

Approve the request for funding in support of Fire Department wellness initiatives.

RECOMMENDED OPTION / FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Option 2 is the recommended option. This option will benefit overall wellness within Fire and Emergency Services and is intended to contribute positively to fitness and improved attendance.

It is recommended that the joint Fire / Wellness Committee in consultation with the City's Health and Safety Manager devise a plan for the purchase of goods and services related to this initiative should Council approve this recommendation.

These are one-time costs that are not of sufficient magnitude to include in the Capital Budget, but as such one-time costs should not be included in an on-going Operating Budget line item.

Currently the Wellness Reserve Fund has a balance of \$342,503.

BACKGROUND

The 2011 Capital Budget included an amount of \$250,000 for the Kings Landing and Marina Rehabilitation Program being Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 85, Project No. 6018MR. This program will address the following:

Kings Landing Review and Repair

This program would engage a structural engineer to review Kings Landing and recommend necessary repairs or maintenance. Repairs would be acted upon on a priority basis to maintain the dock in a safe and sustainable condition.

Marina Fuel Pump Replacement

Replacement of the Marina fuel tanks began in 2010 and is to be completed in the spring of 2011. The fuel pumps at the Marina are nearing the end of the life cycle. The replacement of these fuel pumps would be complimentary to the fuel tank replacement. Their installation will assist with the ongoing service at the Marina and address the need to maintain safe equipment in an environmentally sensitive area.

Marina Dock Replacement

The City wishes to continue with the second year of a six year ongoing replacement and repair of the docks at the Marina. The work is completed by City staff during winter months. The work is necessary as these docks and their floats reach their life expectancy.

Card Swipe Entry & Fencing

Security at the Marina has become an important focus over the last year. Increased activity at the Waterfront is reflected in an increased number of security issues. Improved fencing and a card swipe entry system will restrict access to the boats moored at the Marina and will eliminate the copying of keys.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That Council authorizes City Staff to submit applications to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund and FedNor for capital works related to the development of new industrial lands in areas surrounding North Bay Jack Garland Airport;

- 2. In the event the funding applications are approved, Council will proceed with the City's stated contribution of \$7,584,099 from the Capital Budget, and
- 3. If approved, that Council authorize Staff to amend the Capital Budget to ensure the City's contribution is available.

BACKGROUND

In 2008, City Council authorized City Staff to submit applications for funding for infrastructure works to provide municipal services to lands at the North Bay Jack Garland Airport by way of Resolution No. 2008-708. The infrastructure works included both the construction of a new standpipe and extension of underground infrastructure to vacant lands located on the eastern portion of the airport property. The vacant lands would be developed industrially. Lands closest to the runway would be restricted to developments requiring access to the runway, such as aircraft manufacturing, shipping companies and aircraft maintenance, repair and overhaul operations.

The total project cost is anticipated to be approximately \$13,350,766. This figure is comprised of \$7,750,766 for the construction of the standpipe and an estimated cost of \$5,600,000 for the service extension to the vacant lands.

Requests for funding were submitted to both FedNor and the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund (NOHFC) in 2008. The City's application to the NOHFC has progressed from Stage-1 to Stage-2. At Stage-2, the City is required to provide more detailed information regarding the proposed works.

In the interim since the applications were submitted, City Staff has consulted on multiple occasions with NOHFC and FedNor Staff to ensure compliance with their program's criteria. These consultations have delayed the advancement of the project somewhat.

The City has since proceeded with the construction of the standpipe on the Airport property. Of the total \$7,750,766 cost of the initiative, the City has already contributed \$5,984,099. The balance of the funding was provided by the Municipal Rural Infrastructure Fund (MRIF), a Federal program.

The remaining works to be completed are related to the extension of the municipal services, estimated to cost \$5,600,000. Should all applications be approved at the requested dollar amount, the City's contribution would be \$1,600,000. Under this scenario, Staff would prepare a report to reprioritize the capital budget to ensure the City's contribution is available in 2011 and 2012.

The outstanding applications for funding are requesting \$2,000,000 from the NOHFC and \$2,000,000 from FedNor. As part of the Stage-2 submission, the City must provide a Resolution from City Council supporting the proposed undertaking and confirming the Municipality's contribution to the project. Should Council authorize the applications for funding, the Municipality would proceed with the extension of municipal services.

Rationale

The construction of the standpipe was the first step to creating a new industrial node for the City of North Bay. It will be a community changing project. It is expected the Airport property has the capacity to support over 600 acres of industrial development.

This first phase would provide water and sanitary sewer services to approximately 120 acres of vacant land. Staff foresees multiple projects occurring on these lands, resulting in hundreds of new jobs being created in the coming generation. Additional service extensions will be required for continued development in the future.

The lands lie to the east of North Bay Jack Garland Airport and are suitable for both industrial and aerospace sector projects. The servicing of these lands will provide sites to enable City Staff to aggressively pursue investment leads in these target sectors.

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS

Option #1:

To authorize Staff to submit applications to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund and FedNor. In this option, the City would commit to proceeding with the service extension, should the applications be approved. The City would incur costs of \$1.6M in 2011 and 2012 to extend municipal services. It would require the City to amend the Capital Budget to ensure the City's contribution is available.

Option #2:

Not authorize applications to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund and FedNor. In this option, Staff will withdraw applications from the funding agencies. The City would lose the leverage of the previous investment in the standpipe. This option is not recommended.

RECOMMENDED OPTION / FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Option #1 is the recommended option:

- That Council authorizes City Staff to submit applications to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund and FedNor for capital works related to the development of new industrial lands in areas surrounding North Bay Jack Garland Airport;
- 2. In the event the funding applications are approved, Council will proceed with the City's stated contribution of \$7,584,099 from the Capital Budget; and
- 3. If approved, that Council authorize Staff to amend the Capital Budget to ensure the City's contribution is available.

RECOMMENDATION

1) That a Capital Expenditure By-law be prepared for the consideration of City Council to authorize the Aquatic Centre Rehabilitation Program being 2011 Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 96, Project No. 6029PR at a net debenture cost of \$250,000; and

2) That Council authorize the transfer of \$115,000 from the 2010 Memorial Gardens Rehabilitation Program (Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 2, Project No. 3031RF) to the 2011 Aquatic Centre Rehabilitation Program (Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No. 96, Project No. 6029PR).

BACKGROUND

The 2011 Capital Budget includes an amount of \$250,000 for the Aquatic Centre Rehabilitation Program being Community Services Capital Budget Project Line No.96, Project No. 6029PR. This will provide for the rehabilitation and enhancement of the Aquatic Centre as per the Aquatic Centre Life Cycle from the 2005 Building Condition Assessment report and the 2010 Aquatic Centre Energy Usage Audit. The 2010 report from J.L. Richards identified the following energy efficiency proposals to maximize energy savings; the installation of two heat recovery ventilators and variable speed drives for pool pumps. The estimated payback periods of these are respectively 4.2, 5.5, and 2.4 years. The City has partnered with the YMCA for design and tendering to achieve possible efficiencies and savings.

Council resolution No. 2010-532 authorized the use of \$140,000 from the Memorial Gardens Rehabilitation Program (Project No. 3031RF) for use on the Aquatic Centre Energy Upgrade project. The subject resolution tied these funds to funding approval from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund. The City has not yet received word on the status of the funding application. To complete the City's energy savings initiatives at this facility, it is requested that Council approves allocating \$115,000 of these funds identified in resolution 2010-532 to Aquatic Centre energy upgrades, with or without funding from NOHFC. Should NOHFC's approval direct funds to these improvements, the City's overall contribution will be reduced but, in any event, the project needs to proceed.

An application was filed in July 2010 with NOHFC to include a large heat recovery unit along with two (2) solar projects. The replacements of heat recovery ventilators and variable speed drives have short payback periods while the solar projects are much longer. This project was planned for 2010; however, it has been delayed awaiting a funding decision. Unfortunately, given the condition of the existing units it is important they be replaced early in 2011. Design for the project has been completed and a tender issued in anticipation of a spring 2011 completion.

In seeking equipment replacement and energy upgrades, the City and YMCA has jointly approached this project. A tender (#2010-136) has been issued, pending capital funding approval. The total value of the tender is \$711,658 which includes projects outlined in this report CSBU 20100-24 along with YMCA capital projects. In order to fund this project, we need to consolidate 2010 and 2011 capital as well as utilize the funds from the Memorial Gardens Rehabilitation Project 3031RF.

The estimated annual energy savings is \$93,795.00 providing a simple payback for the City's initiatives at 4.7 years.

BACKGROUND

The City of North Bay has submitted a Stage One application to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund for the first phase of energy upgrades. This application for a total amount of \$250,000 has recently proceeded to the second phase of review. As part of the application process, a resolution from Council must be submitted with the application indicating the Municipality's support for the initiative and confirming the City's stated contribution of \$260,800.

The City of North Bay's Aquatic Centre consumes an average of 375,343 cubic metres of natural gas per year and 926,000 kilowatts of electricity per year. Energy to operate the Aquatic Centre has averaged approximately \$240,000 annually. The high volumes of consumption mean that this facility is vulnerable to swings in energy prices. Large increases in price can impact the Aquatic Centre's operating viability. The YMCA and the City of North Bay are working to implement capital upgrades that will reduce energy consumption at the facility. The two organizations have recently developed a two-year program to reduce energy consumption.

In August 2008, I.B. Storey Professional Energy Solutions provided a report to City staff, which presented a number of opportunities to enhance energy performance. The opportunities that were identified focused on operational improvements, system controls and equipment optimization. On March 9th, 2009, a second report was conducted which outlined the implementation plan for the opportunities identified in the first report. This report provided the City with a project development structure, incentive information and cash flow analysis. Budgets and estimates were also included.

A detailed assessment and preliminary design of energy upgrades was then undertaken by J.L. Richards & Associates Limited in 2009. They were hired to optimize energy efficiency concepts presented in the energy audit by I.B. Storey. They concluded that a comprehensive strategy to optimize energy use be implemented.

The City of North Bay is proposing to undertake the energy upgrades in a two-phase process. Phase one will be for a large Energy Recovery Ventilator (ERV), Solar Thermal Panels and a Solar Wall. These additions have the potential of cutting costs associated with natural gas consumption by approximately 49.5 percent. Phase two of the project will include a small heat recovery unit in the change room of the facility and variable speed drives on existing pumps in the pools. This will result in additional annual savings of \$25,325.

Parks, Recreation and Leisure Services advise that \$120,000 of the City's contribution has previously been approved in the 2010 Capital Budget (Community Services Capital Budget Line No. 16: Parks - Aquatic Centre Rehabilitation Program Capital Project No. 3041PR). In the event the Stage Two application is

approved, Staff recommend reallocating \$140,800 from the Memorial Garden Rehabilitation Program Community Services Capital Budget Line No. 2 Arena – Memorial Gardens Rehabilitation Program Capital oject No. 3031RF), which came in under budget, to make up the balance of the required \$260,800 unicipal contribution.

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS

Option #1:

That Council authorizes City staff to make an application to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund for energy upgrades at the City of North Bay's Aquatic Centre and to confirm the City's required contribution of \$260,800 from the capital budget.

Option #2:

Do not authorize an application to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund. This option is not recommended.

RECOMMENDATION

That a Capital Expenditure By-law be prepared for the consideration of City Council to authorize the Facilities Parks Building Rehabilitation Program being Community Services Capital Budget Project Line #86, Project No. 6019PR at a net debenture cost of \$750,000.

BACKGROUND

Sports Complex:

The original 2011 plan for Project No. 6019PR was for the replacement of the Lee Parks Maintenance Facility. However, with the construction of the Steve Omischl Sports Complex, Council was advised that additional funds would be required to complete the project. In 2011, \$500,000 plus financing costs will be needed to complete such items as, lighting of the one baseball diamond, surfacing of the parking lot and construction of a fence in the end zone of Field "A" adjacent to Lakeshore Drive.

Originally the budget for the construction of the Sports Complex was established at \$9.8 million; however, through Resolution No. 2010-468, City Council increased this amount to \$11.2m. Of these funds, \$3 million will be provided by both the Province and Federal Governments under the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund / Building Canada Fund — Communities Top Up. Additionally, North Bay Youth Soccer is contributing \$500,000 towards the construction of the soccer fields. Contributing to the additional construction cost is the increased site preparation costs, tenders exceeded estimates for both the building and lighting, expanding the ball diamonds, added fencing and HST.

Council should also be aware with the purchase of the McBurney site, approximately \$142,000 has been used from the 2009/2010 Capital Budget to repair and renovate this building so it could be used as a Sports Complex maintenance facility as well to repair equipment and marina docks during the winter months. Included in this is approximately \$33,000 for a crane which permits the repair of marina docks.

Staff and some City Councilors have been approached with respect to the installation of a grass infield at either the Sports Complex or Veteran's Field. From the outset the objective of constructing the Sports Complex has been to meet the widest need of the community as possible, as well as, have the flexibility to accommodate a range of tournament events. Although a grass infield would be ideal for baseball leagues, it would restrict the field's use to essentially the Senior Baseball League and the Bantam Division of the North Bay Baseball Association. These leagues represent some 140 players of a total of 1,790. The priority at this time is to complete the Sports Complex and observe its effect on other fields and reassess the situation in the next two or three years. The cost of installing a grass infield is estimated at \$50,000. We have been advised by other jurisdictions significant additional ongoing maintenance costs would be incurred.

In consultation with all the ball leagues, the fields were extended from 275 feet to 350 feet and to accommodate baseball portions of the outfield fence on one field (Field "E") was raised to 10 feet to provide for a deeper centre field (375 feet). The cost of these two items was approximately \$320,000.

With one of the ball fields at the Sports Complex replacing the Ike Bowness field, the original plan was to install a permanent pitching mound. With the availability of portable mounds, the thought of increasing field flexibility, a portable was tested in the fall of 2010. Feedback from the user groups was not supportive of using these portable mounds on a permanent basis, therefore the installation of a permanent mound is being considered. This decision will hinge on gaining some consensus with the user groups with respect to the location of the permanent mound.

Other Projects:

Lee Park Maintenance Facility:

This facility has been identified in need of replacement for a number of years, however it was determined the postponing of this project had the least impact on user groups and citizens, therefore has been shifted given other priorities. In 2011 the proposal is to develop a design of the facility in preparation for construction in 2012 as noted in the ten year capital plan.

Circle Lake:

In 2009 requests for proposals were sought for the construction of a new community facility within Circle Lake Park. Unfortunately, the proposals were too expensive and eventually due to safety concerns a portion of the facility was demolished. The remaining block structure is in need of repair and the proposal is to provide a portable building at this site.

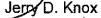

RECOMMENDATION:

That a Capital Expenditure By-Law be prepared for Council's consideration to authorize the replacement of various rural road culverts, being a 2011 Capital Budget, project #6007RD, line item #63, with a net debentured cost of \$155,000.

BACKGROUND:

The approved 2011-2020 ten year capital budget included an amount of \$155,000 for the replacement/rehabilitation of culverts on the City's rural roads.

We are currently evaluating the condition of some of the mid-size culverts on Northshore Road, Widdifield Station Road and Four Mile Lake Road that may warrant replacement this year. In addition, there are numerous culverts which need replacement as part of the rural roadway program.

A Schedule to the proposed By-Law is submitted for consideration of City Council.

Construction Costs \$147,250
Financing \$7,750
Net Debenture Cost \$155,000

ANALYSIS/OPTIONS

Option 1: Proceed with the Authorizing By-Law

To approve the rural road culvert replacement and rehabilitation program highlighted in the 2011-2010 ten year capital budget which includes an amount of \$155,000. This is option is recommended.

Option 2: Cancel outright or reduce

The Council has the option of canceling this project, or reducing the expenditure limit. This would have the effect of creating a backlog of failed or failing culverts, which has the potential to create higher costs and serious inconvenience or injury to the public and the environment. In addition, it would result in a significant decrease in the road construction program if the culvert and drainage costs had to be absorbed in the surfacing project.

RECOMMENDED OPTION

It is recommended that Council approve the drafting of the necessary By-Law, which will authorize the expenditure of funds for the replacement of various rural roadway culverts at a net debentured cost of \$155,000.

RECOMMENDATION:

That a Capital Expenditure By-Law be prepared for the consideration of City Council to authorize the Rural Roadway Reconstruction Program, being 2011 Capital Budget, project #6008RD, line item #64, at a net debentured cost of \$715,000.

BACKGROUND:

The approved 2011 Capital Budget included an amount of \$715,000 for the reconstruction of rural roadways. Over the past 10 years we have implemented an effective program whereby the City's large stockpile of old asphalt pavement was crushed and mixed with an asphalt emulsion and rejuvenating agent and then placed on the roadway through a conventional asphalt pavers, but in a cold rather than hot state. The finished asphalt and its thickness are in the order of 75 mm after compaction. As part of this work, drainage improvements are undertaken as well as granular base and road widening as may be required. In addition, rock removal and sightline obstructions may also be undertaken as part of the reconstruction projects. Previously we utilized a double surface treatment process.

The rural roadways have improved quite noticeably over the past few years as more funding has allowed a greater percentage of the rural roadways to be reconstructed. It is important to keep ahead of the breakdown in the roadway surface as once a surface treated roadway starts to deteriorate; it becomes almost impossible to keep the roadway in a safe condition. Based upon our rural roadway length of 135 kilometers, we should be undertaking a program of approximately 10 kilometers per year in order to properly maintain these roadways. City Council has seen fit to maintain this level of funding and the overall improvement in the condition of the rural roadways is quite evident.

If City Council were to authorize approval to proceed in 2011 the focus will be on Northshore Road and Penninsula Road.

A Schedule to the proposed By-Law is submitted for consideration of City Council.

ANALYSIS/OPTIONS

Option 1: Proceed with the 6008RD Rural Roadway Construction Program

The rural roadways recommended for reconstruction are in relatively poor condition and warrant reconstruction. The funding provided this year will definitely make a significant improvement to approximately 7% of the rural roadways, which is a very reasonable target level.

Option 2: Cancel outright or reduce

The Council has the option of canceling this project, or reducing the expenditure limit. This would have the effect of creating a further backlog of deteriorating rural roadways, which has the potential for higher maintenance costs and serious inconvenience to the public.

RECOMMENDED OPTION

It is recommended that City Council approve of the drafting of the necessary By-Law, which will authorize the expenditure of the funds for the 2011 Rural Roadway Construction Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

That North Bay City Council approve the award of a contract to D. J. Venasse Construction Limited in the amount of \$711,658,00 (HST extra), to implement energy upgrades to the City of North Bay Aquatic Centre and the North Bay YMCA.

BACKGROUND:

The City of North Bay Aquatic Centre and the North Bay YMCA have partnered to undertake a number of energy savings upgrades. The installation of these energy saving projects have been identified in a preliminary report titled, "Detailed Assessment and Preliminary Design of Energy Upgrades at the YMCA and North Bay Aquatic Center, J L Richards 2010.

The tender was publicly advertised in accordance with the City of North Bay Purchasing Policy. Eight (8) tender packages were distributed directly to vendors. Tenders closed on January 19, 2011. Three (3) tenders were received. The tenders were evaluated by the Facilities Supervisor, Purchasing Manager, and the project consultant Piotrowski Consultants Ltd.

The tender was designed that each item would be priced individually. This was done to allow for a reduction to the scope if required for budgetary reasons and to identify the City's portion of the costs. The results are as follows:

One phase of the project was eliminated for budgetary purposes. The City of North Bay portion of the tender shall be \$438,735.00. The price is considered fair and reasonable.

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS:

- 1. Low bidder meets the specification and is recommended for award.
- 2. Do not award a contract. This option is not recommended as the energy upgrades have been identified in order to realize needed energy savings. It is estimated that the Aquatic Centre (City portion) will have yearly savings in gas and hydro combined of \$93,795.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council support the comments to the Ministry of Transportation regarding the update of their Transit Supportive Guidelines prepared by Staff as contained in Appendix A to Report to Council No. CSBU 2011 - 35.

BACKGROUND

The Ministry of Transportation is in the process of updating its Transit Supportive Guidelines, which were first published in collaboration with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing in 1992. The Province is presently circulating a draft of the proposed new guidelines and is accepting comments on the document until March 15th, 2011. As such, the City of North Bay can provide comments to the Ministry of Transportation on this document, should we so elect.

The draft Transit Supportive Guidelines is quite detailed and covers a vast range of subjects. Some of the topics and recommendations that are made to make municipalities more transit-friendly include:

- Providing definitions of different Community Structures (i.e. nodes, corridors, rural areas, etc.) and recommended best practices/policies for each of these sections;
- Layouts of streets, buildings and block patterns;
- Developing complete streets;
- Site layout recommendations for specific types of development (i.e. box stores, institutions, parking lots, etc.);
- Transit service improvements;
- Planning and performance measures;
- Ridership strategies; and
- Implementation strategies.

The above list is intended to provide an overview of the document's contents. There are many specific recommendations found within the document.

The document does recognize many of the standards and best practices that have previously been established by organizations such as the Canadian Urban Transit Association (CUTA). The City of North Bay has utilized targets established by CUTA as the performance measure that the municipality should strive to achieve for a number of years. As a result, the City of North Bay meets many of the best practices outlined in the document. For example, the City of North Bay has ensured that nearly all North Bay dwellings and employers are within 400 metres of a transit stop, as outlined by the Transit Supportive Guidelines on several occasions. Further, the City has given consideration to headway and maximum load targets, as recommended by the document.

The largest shortcoming of the proposed guidelines is that it attempts to provide recommendations and best practices for all communities. However, given the vast differences between the operations of transit in larger communities compared to North Bay's, it is impossible to address the needs of all types of communities in one document.

The proposed guidelines do try to address this shortcoming by placing icons to identify what type of community the recommendation pertains to. For example, recommendations regarding the interconnectivity of multiple modes of transit transportation only apply to the largest of communities. It also endeavours to provide different types of information and recommendations so that communities of all sizes benefit from the proposed guidelines.

However, the vast majority of the information and recommendations pertain to communities that are larger than North Bay. Many of the recommendations contained within the document address issues that, for the most part, do not plague North Bay to the same degree that they do in larger communities. Some of these challenges outlined by the document are heavy traffic congestion, lengthy commute distances and coordinating the seamless transition between multiple modes of transit. As a result, many of the recommendations found in the proposed guidelines would not be feasible, financially or operationally, to implement in North Bay. Specific examples of recommendations found in the proposed guidelines that would be impractical in North Bay include the placement of high occupancy lanes, queuing lanes that allow buses to have first priority at red lights and the placement of intricate transit shelters that would be considerably larger and costlier than the present shelters.

ANALYSIS / OPTIONS

Ultimately, the Transit Supportive Guidelines does not provide regulations with numerical requirements at this time. It is more of a visionary document that suggests courses of action and infrastructure investments that a community should consider. As such, there is not any immediate impact by the draft guidelines, should they be adopted by the Province. It is possible that these guidelines remain a tool for municipalities to consider in their planning decisions, similar to a best practice manual.

However, staff is concerned that the guidelines will eventually be utilized as a measure of a municipality's adherence to the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS 2005) and any successor document. Over the long-term, this could theoretically obligate the municipality to alter its infrastructure spending to meet the recommendations contained in the document. As many of the recommendations cited in the document pertain to much larger transit systems, such as those found in the GTA, staff is of the opinion that it would not be practical to implement many of the proposed recommendations in North Bay.

Option #1:

To provide comments to the Ministry of Transportation regarding the update of their Transit Supportive Guidelines. Comments prepared by Staff expressing the above cited concerns are attached.

Option #2:

To not comment on the proposed update of the Transit Supportive Guidelines. This would result in Staff's concerns not being conveyed to the Ministry of Transportation. This option is not recommended.

RECOMMENDED OPTION/FINANCIAL IMPLICATION

That Council support the comments to the Ministry of Transportation regarding the update of their Transit Supportive Guidelines prepared by staff as contained in Appendix A to Report to Council No. CSBU 2011 - 35.

We are consistent with many of the principles listed within the document, particularly those that are reflective of the guidelines established by the Canadian Urban Transit Association (CUTA). The City of North Bay has utilized targets established by CUTA as the performance measure that the municipality should strive to achieve for a number of years. For example, the City of North Bay has ensured that nearly all North Bay dwellings and employers are within 400 metres of a transit stop, as outlined by the Transit Supportive Guidelines on several occasions. The City has given consideration to headway and maximum load targets, as recommended by the document. The City's fleet of transit vehicles is scheduled to be fully accessible by 2012.

From our perspective, the largest weakness of the proposed guidelines is that it attempts to provide recommendations and best practices for all communities. Given the vast differences between the operations of transit in larger communities compared to North Bay's, it is impossible to address the needs of all types of communities in one document.

We acknowledge that the proposed guidelines do try to address this shortcoming by placing icons to identify what type of community the recommendation pertains to. For example, recommendations regarding the interconnectivity of multiple modes of transit transportation only apply to the largest of communities. It also endeavours to provide different types of information and recommendations so that communities of all sizes benefit from the proposed guidelines.

Over the past year we have implemented a program whereby the City puts aside capital funds to do emergency asphalt repairs in sections of roadways until they can be addressed through the regular capital reconstruction budget. The sections of roads to be done are chosen by roads personnel where they are encountering significant maintenance costs and safety concerns.

A Schedule to the proposed By-Law is submitted for Council's consideration.

ANALYSIS/OPTIONS

Option 1: Proceed with the Authorizing By-law

> Proceed with the Asphalt Resurfacing Sheeting Program. The roads chosen for this program are in relatively poor condition and warrant these emergency repairs providing these repairs improve the riding surface of these roads until reconstruction can occur.

Cancel outright or reduce Option 2:

> The Council has the option of canceling this project, or reducing the expenditure limit. This action would increase the number of backlogs of deteriorating roadways, which has the potential to create higher maintenance costs, serious inconvenience to the public and/or posing safety concerns to the traveling public.

RECOMMENDED OPTION

It is recommended that Council approve the drafting of the necessary By-Law, which will authorize this year's expenditure for the 6004RD Asphalt Resurfacing Sheeting Program.

BACKGROUND:

The approved 2011-2020 ten year capital budget included an amount of \$516,000 for the rehabilitation of residential streets to improve the ride quality on local roads. The work is multi-phase and can be completed in cooperation with other Capital Infrastructure Projects.

There is a growing requirement to maintain focus on the rehabilitation of the City's residential streets as the life expectancy of the roadways asphalt surface reaches its end. This project involves the rehabilitation of the street's infrastructure, asphalt surface and/or sub base material as required. This year the City will focus is on First Avenue between Sherbrooke and Wylde Streets.

The Council has the option of canceling this project, or reducing the expenditure limit. This would have the effect of creating a backlog and not meeting the growing requirements to maintain the quality of our residential streets.

It is recommended that City Council approve of the drafting of the necessary By-Law, which will authorize the expenditure of the funds for the rehabilitation of residential City Streets at a net debenture cost of \$516,000

IN THE CITY OF NORTH BAY

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and in the interest of The Corporation of the City of North Bay that part of the laneway located in a block bounded by Regina Street, Franklin Street, Ellis Street and Laurier Avenue, abutting Lots 38, 39, 40 and 41 and Lots 10, 11, 12 and 13, Plan 81 be closed, stopped up and sold to the abutting owners;

AND WHEREAS by Resolution No. 2009-298 passed on the 27th day of April, 2009, Council approved the closure of the laneway;

AND WHEREAS the laneway abutting Lots 38, 39, 40 and 41 and Lots 10, 11, 12 and 13, Plan 81 is hereby declared to be surplus;

AND WHEREAS notice of this by-law was published once a week for two consecutive weeks in the North Bay Nugget, published in the City of North Bay;

AND WHEREAS no person has claimed that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the passing of this by-law nor applied to be heard in person or by his counsel, solicitor, or agent, the Council of the City nor a Committee of said Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That certain part of the laneway abutting Lots 38, 39, 40 and 41 and Lots 10, 11, 12 and 13, Plan 81, designated as Parts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 10 on Reference Plan 36R-12868 is hereby closed, stopped up and conveyed.
- The City shall transfer Parts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 10, Plan 36R-12868 to the owners
 of the lands abutting thereon, their successors or assigns, upon receipt of the
 consent in writing of the abutting registered owner, if the transfer is to be to a person
 other than the abutting registered owner.
- 3.(a) Subject to paragraph (b), in the event that an abutting owner to the said laneway does not consent to the disposition of the laneway within 60 days of the date of the passing of this by-law, then the clerk shall, upon request of an abutting owner of the opposite side of the laneway, give 30 days notice by prepaid registered mail to the abutting owner of the laneway to the effect that if the abutting owner does not agree to purchase one-half of the abutting laneway at a pro-rata share of the survey, legal, advertising costs and purchase price incurred in the laneway closing, then the said one-half of the laneway may be transferred to the opposite owner for the same cost.
- (b) Upon receipt of an Irrevocable Consent of the disposition of the laneway from the adjacent owner then that portion of the laneway may be transferred upon registration of the by-law.
- This by-law comes into force and effect upon a certified copy of the by-law being registered in the Land Titles Office for the District of Nipissing.
