1. North Bay Gaming Facility

Councillor Mendicino explained the purpose of the meeting.

The City Clerk advised that notice of the meeting was given by way of an advertisement in the North Bay Nugget on Saturday, August 4th, Saturday, August 11th and Saturday, August 18th, 2012.

Jerry Knox explained the purpose of the public meeting.

Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation Presentation: John MacFarland – Regional Gaming Director Paul Pellizzari – Director of Policy and Social Responsibility

Councillor Mendicino asked for public presentations in support of or objecting to a Gaming Facility in the City of North Bay.

North Bay and District Chamber of Commerce John Strang – President 562 Groulx Road, Astorville Provided copy of presentation

- The Chamber fully supports the Casino
- Represent 1,500 tax payers
- At the June 8th, 2012 Board Meeting the Chamber passed a Resolution in support of the Casino
- The Chamber is the voice of business, believes that this will bring jobs, grow the City's tax base and attract tourism 365 days a year
- Buses leave each day from the City taking individuals to Sudbury or Orillia, which is money that could stay within our community
- The Chamber was a participant in an Economic Impact Study prepared by Suthey, Holler & Associates in 1997 (copy provided)
- The Economic Impact Study concluded that there would be a total of \$9.3 million of new spending annually in the City
- This will help the restaurants, gas stations and hotels within the City
- Does not believe that the Casino will be a detriment to the existing bingo halls – they can co-exist
- There is currently gambling happening within the City the Casino has the potential to draw more people to North Bay.

North Bay Downtown Improvement Area Robert Alger, Chair 333 Second Avenue East, North Bay Provided copy of presentation

- The DIA is in favour of a Casino
- He is not only the Chair of the DIA but owns a business in the downtown
- The DIA Board held a Special Meeting on August 8, 2012 to discuss the pros and cons of a casino in the Downtown
- The DIA passed a Resolution at the August 8th meeting in favour of the Casino

- The DIA have done their due diligence by contacting other municipalities and receiving their input as to the advantages and disadvantages of having a Casino in the City
- Jeff Serran the Executive Director of the DIA and Robert Alger were in Thunder Bay at a conference and had the opportunity to visit the casino and speak with Mayor Hobbs
- Mayor Hobbs' feedback was positive they have had growth and employment; there are of course some negatives but the pros outweigh the cons
- Downtown Orillia the business owners had positive comments the buses going to the Casino will drop people off in the downtown
- Thunder Bay and Orillia current have Destination Tours

AND WHEREAS the Government of Canada is developing a new Long Term Infrastructure Plan for federal support for infrastructure in Canada;

AND WHEREAS despite increased investment in municipal infrastructure by municipal, provincial and federal orders of government in recent years, Ontario's municipalities still have a significant infrastructure deficit.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY RESOLVES THAT:

- Any new federal infrastructure support program must be long-term in its scope and horizon, ideally at least ten years, to help infrastructure investment partners tackle our significant infrastructure needs;
- Ontario, as Canada's most populous province, should be allocated infrastructure support under any new federal infrastructure support commensurate with its population and economic importance;
- 3. Any new federal infrastructure support program must recognize the number and variety of infrastructure systems owned, managed and operated by municipalities in Ontario and the critical supports these provide to local communities and economies by providing for an exclusive municipal allocation in any new federal infrastructure support program;
- 4. The priorities of local governments in Ontario, as defined by their long-term municipal asset management plans, must be recognized and eligible for direct federal support under any new federal infrastructure support program;

 Those municipalities that have or will have comprehensive asset management plans in place at the time the Federal program is in effect should be considered immediately eligible for any new infrastructure program funding from the federal government.

BEING A BY-LAW TO CONFIRM PROCEEDINGS OF THE MEETING OF COUNCIL ON AUGUST 27, 2012

WHEREAS the *Municipal Act, R.S.O. 2001*, Chapter 25, (the "Act") Section 5(1), provides that the powers of a municipal corporation shall be exercised by Council;

AND WHEREAS Section 5 (3) of the Act provides a municipal power, including a municipality's capacity, rights, powers and privileges under section 9 of the Act, shall be exercised by by-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise and any of the matters shall be implemented by the exercise of the natural person powers;

AND WHEREAS in many cases action which is taken or authorized to be taken by Council does not lend itself to the passage of an individual by-law;

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the actions of the Council of The Corporation of the City of North Bay at its meeting held on August 27, 2012 in respect of each motion, resolution and other action passed and taken by the Council at its said Meeting is, except where the prior approval of the Ontario Municipal Board or other authority is by law required, hereby adopted, ratified and confirmed.
- 2. That where no individual by-law has been passed with respect to the taking of any action authorized in or by the Council mentioned in Section 1 hereof or with respect to the exercise of any powers of the Council, then this by-law shall be deemed for all purposes to the by-law required for approving and authorizing the taking of any action authorized therein or thereby required for the exercise of any powers therein by Council.
- 3. That the Mayor and the proper officers of The Corporation of the City of North Bay are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the said actions or to obtain approvals where required, and to execute all documents as may be necessary and directed to affix the corporate seal to all such documents as required.

BY-LAW NO. 2012-192

A BY-LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE SUBMISSION OF AN APPLICATION TO THE ONTARIO INFRASTRUCTURE AND LANDS CORPORATION ("OILC") FOR FINANCING CERTAIN ONGOING CAPITAL WORKS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY (THE "MUNICIPALITY"); TO AUTHORIZE TEMPORARY BORROWING FROM OILC TO MEET EXPENDITURES IN CONNECTION WITH SUCH WORKS; AND TO AUTHORIZE LONG TERM BORROWING FOR SUCH WORKS THROUGH THE ISSUE OF DEBENTURES TO OILC

WHEREAS the *Municipal Act, 2001* (Ontario), as amended, (the "Act") provides that a municipal power shall be exercised by by-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise;

AND WHEREAS the application to OILC was approved by Resolution No. 2012-508 passed by Council at its Regular Meeting held on the 27th day of August, 2012;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality has passed the by-laws enumerated in column (1) of Schedule "A" attached hereto and forming part of this By-law ("**Schedule** "A") authorizing the capital works described in column (2) of Schedule "A" (individually a "**Project**", collectively the "**Projects**") in the amount of the respective estimated expenditure set out in column (3) of Schedule "A";

AND WHEREAS before the Council of the Municipality approved each Project in accordance with section 4 of Ontario Regulation 403/02, the Council of the Municipality had its Treasurer update its most recent annual debt and financial obligation limit received from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (as so updated, the "**Updated Limit**"), and, on the basis of the authorized expenditure for each Project as set out in column (3) of Schedule "A" ("**Authorized Expenditure**"), the Treasurer calculated the estimated annual amount payable in respect of each Project and determined that the estimated annual amount payable in respect of each Project does not exceed the Updated Limit, and accordingly the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board under the Ontario Municipal Board Act (Ontario), as amended, was not required before any such Project was authorized by Council;

AND WHEREAS subsection 405 (1) of the Act provides that a municipality may authorize temporary borrowing to meet expenditures made in connection with a work to be financed in whole or in part by the issue of debentures if,

- (a) the municipality is an upper-tier municipality, a lower-tier municipality in a county or a single-tier municipality and it has approved the issue of debentures for the work;
- (b) the municipality is a lower-tier municipality in a regional municipality and it has approved the work and the upper-tier municipality has approved the issue of debentures for the work; or
- (c) the municipality has approved the issue of debentures for another municipality or a school board under section 404;

AND WHEREAS subsection 401(1) of the Act provides that a municipality may incur a debt for municipal purposes, whether by borrowing money or in any other way, and may issue debentures and prescribed financial instruments and enter prescribed financial agreements for or in relation to the debt;

AND WHEREAS the Act also provides that a municipality shall authorize long term borrowing by the issue of debentures or through another municipality under section 403 or 404 of the Act;

AND WHEREAS OILC has invited Ontario municipalities desirous of obtaining temporary and long term debt financing in order to meet capital expenditures incurred after December 31, 2003 in connection with eligible capital projects to make application to OILC for such financing by completing and submitting an application on the form provided by OILC (the "**Application**");

AND WHEREAS the Municipality has submitted an Application to OILC to request financing in order to meet capital expenditures incurred in connection with the Projects after December 31, 2003 (the "**Post 2003 Expenditures**") by way of long term borrowing through the issue of debentures to OILC and by way of temporary borrowing from OILC pending the issue of such debentures;

AND WHEREAS OILC has accepted and has approved the municipality's Application;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Council of the Municipality hereby confirms, ratifies and approves the completion by the Treasurer of an Application and the submission by such authorized official of an Application, duly executed by such authorized official, to OILC for the financing of Post 2003 Expenditures for the Projects in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$9,800,000 substantially in the form of Schedule "B" hereto and forming part of this By-law, with such changes thereon as such authorized official approved.
- 2. The Mayor and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to negotiate and enter into, execute and deliver for and on behalf of the Municipality a financing agreement (a "Financing Agreement") with OILC that provides for temporary and long term borrowing from OILC in respect of Post 2003 Expenditures for the Projects on such terms and conditions as such authorized officials may approve, such execution and delivery to be conclusive evidence of such approval.
- 3. The Mayor and/or the Treasurer are hereby authorized, pending the substantial completion of a Project or as otherwise agreed with OILC, to make temporary borrowings pursuant to section 405 of the Act in order to meet Post 2003 Expenditures, on the terms and conditions provided in the Financing Agreement and on such other terms and conditions as such authorized officials may agree, and to sign such evidence of indebtedness as OILC may require (a "Note"); and the Treasurer is authorized to sign such certifications as OILC may require in connection with such borrowings in respect of each Project; provided that the amount of borrowings allocated to any Project does not exceed the Authorized Expenditure for such Project and does not exceed the loan amount set out in column (4) of Schedule "A" in respect of such Project and does not exceed the loan amount set out in column (4) of Schedule "A" in respect of such Project.
- 4. Subject to the terms and conditions of the Financing Agreement and such other terms and conditions as OILC may otherwise require, the Mayor and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to enter into long term borrowing in respect of the Projects and to issue debentures to OILC on the terms and conditions provided in the Financing Agreement and on such other terms and conditions as such authorized officials may agree ("Debentures"); provided that the principal amount of such Debentures issued in respect of a Project does not exceed the Authorized Expenditure for such Project and does not exceed the loan amount set out in column (4) of Schedule "A" in respect of such Project.
- 5. In accordance with the provisions of section 25 of the *Ontario Infrastructure and Lands Corporation Act, 2011*, as amended from time

to time hereafter, as security for the payment by the Municipality of the indebtedness of the Municipality to OILC under the Debentures (the "Obligations"), the Municipality is hereby authorized to agree in writing with OILC that the Minister of Finance is entitled, without notice to the Municipality, to deduct from money appropriated by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario for payment to the Municipality, amounts not exceeding the amounts that the Municipality fails to pay OILC on account of the Obligations and to pay such amounts to OILC from the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

- 6. For purposes of meeting the obligations of the Municipality in respect of the Note and any Debentures, the Municipality shall provide for raising in each year as part of the general levy, the amounts of principal and interest payable in each year under the Note and any outstanding Debenture, to the extent that such amounts have not been provided for by any other available source including other taxes or fees or charges imposed on persons or property by a by-law of any municipality.
- 7. (a) The Mayor and/or the Treasurer are hereby authorized to execute and deliver the Note, the Mayor and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to enter into, execute and deliver the Financing Agreement and to cause Debentures to be issued, the Clerk and Treasurer are severally hereby authorized to generally do all things and to execute all other documents and papers in the name of the Municipality in order to perform the obligations of the Municipality under the Financing Agreement and to carry out the issuance of the Note and Debentures and the Treasurer is authorized to affix the Municipality's municipal seal to any such documents and papers.
 - (b) The proceeds realized in respect of the Note and Debentures, after providing for the expenses related to their issue, if any, shall be apportioned and applied for the respective Projects and for no other purpose except as permitted by the Act.
- 8. This By-law takes effect on the day of passing.

A BY-LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE WATER & SEWER RECONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

WHEREAS the *Municipal Act*, 2001 (S.O. 2001, c-25), Section 10 authorizes the Council to pass a by-law for the purposes therein stated;

AND WHEREAS the *Municipal Act*, 2001 (S.O. 2001, c-25), Section 401 authorizes the Council to pass a by-law for the purposes herein stated;

AND WHEREAS the Council passed Resolution 2012-501 at its meeting held on Monday, August 27, 2012, authorizing the 2012 Water & Sewer Reconstruction Program for the Engineering, Environmental & Works Department, being 2012 Water and Sanitary Sewer Capital Budget Project No. 6092SS, with a net debenture cost of \$53,000.00;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NORTH BAY HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the expenditure of \$53,000.00 for the Water & Sewer Reconstruction Program for the following be hereby authorized:

Construction Costs \$50,350.00 Financing Costs 2,650.00

Net Amount to be Debentured

\$53,000.00

- 2. That the Treasurer of the City of North Bay is hereby authorized to borrow from time to time from any bank or person by way of promissory note(s) and/ or temporary advances of money to meet the cost of work as aforesaic pending the completion thereof and pending the issue and sale of the debentures hereinafter referred to but in no event shall the aggregate of such borrowings exceed the amount of \$53,000.00 limited in this by-law.
- 3. Any promissory note(s) issued pursuant to paragraph 2 hereof shall be sealed with the seal of The Corporation of the City of North Bay and signed by the Mayor or Deputy Mayor and the Treasurer of the City of North Bay.
- 4. That the cost of the works in the amount of \$53,000.00 be funded first from the water and sanitary sewer rates, and if required the balance be funded by debentures to be issued to pay for the cost of such work.
- 5. That the debentures to be issued to pay for the cost of such work shall bear interest at such rate as the Council may determine and shall be made payable within ten (10) years and shall be a charge against all rateable property in the Urban Service Area of The Corporation of the City of North Bay, to such an extent as the principal and interest payments are not recovered from the water and sanitary sewer rates.
